

### Minutes of the Annual Meeting Sunday, January 30, 2022

The Annual Meeting of St. Columba's Episcopal Church was opened at 10:51 a.m. with prayer by Fr. Greg Larkin with an Opening Prayer.

Fr. Greg prayed for all the parishioners who had died this past year.

A motion to dispense with the reading of the minutes from the previous Annual Meeting was moved, seconded, and passed.

Fr. Greg thanked members of the School Board for their service, as well as thanking retiring Vestry Members Barbara Amick, Deborah Brown and Fran Cogswell. He announced that Susan Doswell will be the new Senior Warden for the upcoming year. He also thanked Doug Miller for his service as Senior Warden this past year.

Next item of business was to elect Diocesan Delegates for the upcoming 2022 year. Maurice and Gail Hill will serve as Delegates, with Gwen and Bob Waite as Alternates. It was moved and seconded that these parishioners serve in these capacities; the motion passed.

New Vestry member nominees were introduced: Paul Amendt, Marjo Gardner, and Marianne Hyde. Deborah Brown moved and Barbara Amick seconded that these three nominees be accepted as new Vestry members for upcoming three-year terms; the motion passed.

Presentation of annual ministry reports was the next agenda item. Parishioners had the reports in hand with the Annual Report. Maurice Hill further explained the ongoing Food Ministries—funding from various sources, generally how the program runs, etc. He thanked everyone for their continued support of our program and the outreach we extend to the community.

A review of the Budget was presented. Overall, we are in good shape, and appreciation for continued support was expressed by Treasurer Gail Hill. Complete financial information was included in the Report for all to review.

Fr. Greg expressed hope that we will soon be able to return to "things we have had to put on hold" for the past two years, returning to old events and making our face known in the community again. He wanted to especially thank Bill Brown for his work on restoring the outdoor altar and Jeanette Barcroft for her continued, unwavering work on the labyrinth, also Brett Hanley for his assistance in that area.

At this time in the meeting, Fr. Greg commissioned the new Vestry—Paul Amendt, Carlos Barraza, Loralee Brown, Susan Doswell, Marjo Gardner, Teri Helton, Marianne Hyde, Doug Miller—which will serve for the upcoming 2022 year.

Following the Commissioning of the Vestry, Fr. Greg announced that he would be retiring on July 1, 2022. He went into a short explanation of what will occur, explaining briefly about the search, interim situation, and how this will be a time of work for each and every one of us. He thanked everyone for his journey with us and stated that he will still be hanging around!

As there was no further business, Barbara Amick moved that the meeting be adjourned, Deborah Brown seconded; the motion passed.

Fr. Greg led us in a closing prayer.



## + Columbarium +

The columbarium serves as a repository and testament for many of the lives that blessed and enriched our parish life. The columbarium has a total of 120 niches of which 86 have been contracted for. To date, fifty-nine parishioners have been inurned in the columbarium.

The columbarium fund ended the year with \$40,266.53.

Historically, burial inside the church was once reserved to honor noteworthy clerics and nobles. Now it is possible to grant this blessing to all God's children to "dwell in the house of the Lord forever." Liturgically, it sets aside a place for remembrance and love for the departed. At \$1,200, the cost of the niche is modest compared to a burial plot and is ecologically sound. ## + Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors + + Storytellers +



A **Eucharistic Minister** is a lay person authorized to administer the Consecrated Elements at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist. A Eucharistic Minister should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith. [Canons of the General Convention, Title III, Canon 4, Section 6]

Canon 4, Section 1 (a) specifies that this ministry is open to confirmed communicants in good standing and that they are licensed by the Bishop and under the direction of the Clergy in charge of the congregation.

Currently, COVID restrictions prevent us from having Communion using the common cup. Instead, we are using small individual cups for wine. The Eucharistic Ministers leads the Intercessions (Prayers of the People) and prepares wine cups for Communion.

Currently active and licensed Eucharistic Ministers are Paul Amendt, Mary Steppes-Cole, Maria Fernandez, Teri Helton, Nancy Miller, and Bob Waite.



**Lectors** are lay persons appointed by the Rector to assist in worship by reading the Old Testament Lesson and the Epistle, as well as by leading the recitation of the Psalm.

Currently, active Lectors are Paul Amendt, Mary Steppes-Cole, Marjo Gardner, Maurice Hill, Diane Off, Lara Tyas, Maria Fernandez, Beverly

Pearson, and John Pearson.

Our **Biblical Storytellers** have been trained by the Rev. Dr. Dina Ferguson, past President of the Network of Biblical Storytellers, using a method known as Scripture by Heart. The goal is to present the text of the appointed Lesson without referring to written text or notes—and to do it accurately as to both the text itself and the story being told. There is no requirement that the presentations be dramatic, although they can be; the primary difference between a Lector's and a Storyteller's presentations is the immediacy of the

words, without a lectern between the Storyteller and the congregation. During COVID, we've become less active but hope to resume presentations this year. Our current Storytellers are Paul Amendt and Nancy Miller. If you are interested in this ministry, please speak with Pastor Mark.


# + Ushers Report +

## 💥 Children's Learning Center 💥

The staff, School Board, and I have continued our mission to make St. Columba's Children's Learning Center Camarillo's premier Christian-based program.

This year, we began building our outdoor classrooms. Outdoor play provides essential support for children's health and wellness, including brain development, social and emotional development, appropriate risk assessment, gross and fine motor development, coordination, and self-confidence. As they play outdoors, children observe physics, geometry, biology, and so much more. A growing body of research demonstrates how physical activity activates the brain. We know that young children learn best by DOING. Their interactions with the natural world provide invaluable opportunities for growth and learning. An Outdoor Classroom is a space for children to interact with the natural items through play-based and multi-sensory activities. The goal of the Outdoor Classroom is simple: to increase the quantity, quality, and benefits of outdoor experiences for children. support emotional, behavioral, education and play and development. Studies have shown that students who learn outdoors develop: a sense of self, independence, confident, creativity, decision-making and problem-solving skills, empathy towards others, motor skills, self-discipline, and initiative. In the outdoor classroom, children connect to the natural world and learn from what nature has to teach us. We envision a world where all children have access to the rich developmental opportunities that come from engaging with the natural world. This project will be continuous and will grow with our program for years to come.

Our major social events were brought back over this year were well attended by staff, parents, family members and friends. Everyone enjoyed Back to School Night at the beginning of the year where the teachers introduced themselves and set goals with parents. Trunk-or-Treat was once again a huge success for all. This year we once again had our very own pumpkin patch and it continues to be a huge success! We were able to celebrate the Harvest Festival/Pumpkin Patch for two weeks and the children were able to participate in so many fun events. The Christmas Program and Holiday Bundt Cake Sale were not only well received, but the school's biggest fundraiser of the year, raising over \$5,000. This year we brought back Mom's Night Out fundraiser, moms from our program got together and played Bunco

and donated the proceeds to our program. These events help give our school a sense of community and are also a lot of fun! We have continued to hold events where we participate in conjunction with the church, in doing so to we are working towards maintaining a strong partnership.

Our summer program was once again a hit! Many families stayed throughout the summer and enjoyed the activities we provided. Over the summer each week the classes had different "camps." We offered Authors and Artists, Music, Sports, Fun in the Sun, VBS and so many other camps. We transformed the classes into underwater adventures, castles, camping grounds and much more!

CLC is in a strong financial position, and has continued to have positive cash flow. Enrollment has continued to stay full for the 2021-22 school year, this is including our summer program. Some of the major expenses we were able to accomplish this school year were landscaping and adding synthetic grass/turf to our outdoor classrooms.

The school provided a monthly pledge of \$1,700 per month to the church, as well as contributions towards the telephone, Xerox, utilities, supplies, and gardener bills. We increased our monthly pledge in September 2022 to \$1,950.

Our teaching staff consists of ten teachers and one part-time occupational therapist who assists the staff and myself. I have continued to attend meetings with local Preschool Directors Group allowing me to network, offer and receive support, information and maintain genuine friendship. We were able to provide tours to staff and school boards from Mount Cross, Good Shepherd and PV Christian.

Going into the 2022-2023 school year, we are currently fully enrolled, numerous children on our waitlist and many families needing/wanting more days.

I want to thank all of St. Columba's Church parishioners and our wonderful School Board Members for their knowledge, patience, support and dedication over the past year– I could not have done my job without all of you!

## **% Children's Ministries**

The goal of the Children's Ministries Programs at St. Columba's is to involve adults and children in a common religious experience in which the primary values of childhood are predominate, especially those of simplicity, contemplation and joy.

"Catechesis" is formation in the Christian faith through interpersonal relationship under the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

In the St. Columba's Atria, the catechists are guides and the children are invited to respond rather than have religious information "poured in" into their heads.

At St. Columba's the children's formation program is Catechesis of the Good Shepherd.

MINISTRIES Based on the Montessori philosophy of education, the *Catechesis* program is divided into three levels of three-year cycles that correspond to the physical and mental development of children. Throughout the three cycles, the child is presented with the essentials of our faith in increasing detail and sophistication. Celebrations or para-liturgies (Advent, Epiphany, Liturgy of the Light, and Pentecost) are held in the Atria throughout the liturgical year.

As in 2021, 2022 saw the presentations with classes from the St. Columba's Preschool postponed or cancelled. As the year continued, parish family events such as the Easter Egg Hunt and Advent Preparation Evenings were arranged to be as safe as possible, often in conjunction with Mount Cross Lutheran Church, and with the accompanying potlucks being canceled.

In the atria, the year was one of continuing to update and fill in the materials (resources), primarily for the Level III *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* atrium in preparation for young adults being presented at Confirmation in June. We also had a new child in the Level I Atrium, so with the help of parents, and being very flexible week to week, presentations were given in each atrium.

The Level I presentations included Parable of the Good Shepherd, Psalm 23 vs 1, the Parables of the Kingdom—for the Mustard Seed and the Grain of Wheat, and the presentation of Baptism, when we come to belong to the Good Shepherd.

In the Level III Atrium we continued to explore more of the specifics of various cultures, The People of God, various peoples throughout time, including the people of the last Century and their contributions to *The Plan of God* and God's plan of Cosmic Communion, "a time when God will be all in all." Finally, we reflected on our own lives, the contributions made to us and by us, and re-establishing our own commitment to live as one of God's children, adding to our knowledge of the Rite of Confirmation.

Building a spiritual community for children, as with adults, requires commitment. As a Christian Formation program, the *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* requires the same kinds of commitments: primarily a commitment on the part of the parents and child to have the child in the "Atrium" or classroom on a regular basis. Many thanks to our parents who struggle with early morning time crunches, scheduling conflicts, no free days, and who see that their children do come on a regular basis to class.

Future needs will continue to focus on bringing new people with children into our parish so our program may grow. If you are interested, there are two ways to participate. I am eager to train an interested party as an assistant for the atrium. Additionally, I would love to speak with any individuals who are willing to help us by making materials that are used week after week.

I invite you to become more like a child. To come, see, explore, learn more about Jesus, the Kingdom of God and The Plan of God by doing Christian Formation with us!



# <u>Project Hope at St. Columba's</u> <u>A SuperPantry Collaborating with Food Share, Ventura County</u>



The Emergency Need Pantry, the Project Hope Pantry for Seniors and Families, and the newer St. Columba's Pantry are all part of the food ministries at St Columba's. All food ministries at St. Columba's receive donations in funds and food items from our parish members, Food Share and USDA, neighboring churches, and friends in the community, as well as funds from the City of Camarillo through a HUD Federal Grant. We are a partner in the Food Share Network and Feeding America. We continue to be ready to serve those who come

to us in need of assistance. All people are welcome to receive food from one of our ministries. We always accept food and PPE donations. Project Hope provides food in the morning and afternoon on the 2nd and 4th Thursday of each month. Food is also delivered to seniors who do not have transportation. St. Columba's Pantry provides food and PPE assistance on alternate Thursday afternoons (1st, 3rd, and 5th Thursdays).

Project Hope distributed staples, canned and dried food, bread, produce, and as available, fresh and frozen protein items. Typically, we serve about 35 families on each distribution day. Special thanks to those who work faithfully on Project Hope and have made sure that it supports the community. Food and Supplies pick-up at Food Share Warehouse on Tuesday morning: George Anderson and Cliff Aggen. Bag layout, food inventory set-up on Wednesdays—those working that part of the ministries have been: George Anderson, Doug Miller, and Cliff Aggen. Thursday mornings for bag stuffing and parking lot distribution to client's cars: George Anderson, Doug Miller, Loralee Brown, Fr. Greg Larkin, Judith Laurentowski, Marjo Gardner, Michele Hauser. The Thursday morning delivery crew for seniors without transportation: Judith Laurentowski, Loralee Brown, Tony Slade, and Marjo Gardner. The Thursday afternoon/evening distributors: Cliff Aggen, Doug Miller, and Fr. Greg Larkin. Special thanks for super support go to: The Boy Scouts of Troop 262 for their annual food drive with the food being given to Food Share; and the congregations of local churches for food and monetary donations: Trinity Presbyterian, Mount Cross Lutheran, Peace Lutheran, and Camarillo United Methodist; the CROP Walk and individual monetary donors; members of the community for their monetary donations; Food Share and USDA for most of the food that we distributed.

Cliff Aggen has been managing Project Hope for many years since he took over for Harry Daubert. Cliff has been critical to this food program, and everyone—the clients, the volunteers, the community, and Food Share—will truly miss Cliff and all he has done for the ministry and the community.

For Thanksgiving and Christmas, we gave roasted and then frozen chickens to our seniors and smaller families and voucher for turkey dinners to our large families. At Christmas, we gave gift cards to seniors and families that were approved by the Vestry and provided by St. Columba's Food Ministries funds. Parishioners gave gifts to the children of Project Hope, and Laura Jones generously and tirelessly made wool watch caps for the Project Hope families.

#### St. Columba's Pantry

St. Columba's Pantry held its first distribution on February 18, 2021. St. Columba's received a Community Development Block Grant from the City of Camarillo and HUD to fund the pantry for about a year. In 2022, we received a second grant for a smaller amount of money which will fund us into February/March 2023. We provide PPE (e.g., face masks, hand sanitizer, disinfecting wipes, soap, toilet paper, paper towels, Kleenex); food (e.g., canned tuna and chicken, canned vegetables, pasta sauce, pasta, soup, rice); and fresh vegetables and fruit (e.g., spinach, broccoli, squash, carrots, celery, fruit, tomatoes, corn, melons, strawberries) on the Thursdays that Project Hope doesn't distribute. These items were provided to low-income families in the community. Nutritious food and fresh vegetables & fruit are critical to people as they strive to stay healthy and maintain their immunity to disease. We purchase fresh produce from Santiago's Produce in Ventura. We have served over 60 families since we started. Typically, we have about 32 families participate in the program on any given Thursday. We couldn't do this ministry for the Camarillo community without the help of several parishioners: Doug Miller, Frannie Cogswell, George Anderson, Lyle & Marianne Hyde, Gene Doswell, Judith Laurentowski, Richard Stone, Pam Smith, Gail & Maurice Hill, Fr. Greg Larkin, and Interim Pastor Mark Asman. Many thanks to all!

Since August 18, 2006, the St. Columba's website has undergone many changes. On that date, *This Week at St. Columba*'s began its life, with a weekly publication of events in the parish as well as from the wider church as well. The number of our email subscribers has increased considerably since our beginning.

In 2017, we rebuilt the entire website with a new hosting service. It is now more streamlined and much easier to edit and maintain. As a result, when new information is known, the website may be quickly revised. We can also add almost unlimited pages. Our website has continued to evolve to meet the changing needs of the community and the changing world with respect to the COVID pandemic. During the time we could not meet in-person, we opted for livestreamed services via Facebook and YouTube. As the pandemic threat lessened, St. Columba's returned to in-person worship services while keeping the format of livestreamed Spiritual Communion. That has given our website a new mission—namely, to livestream our services primarily for those with health issues that prevent them from attending in-person, as well as those who may be scattered across the world. Because our services are recorded on Facebook and YouTube, they are available at any time for viewers to access. We will continue this hybrid format of worship as long as COVID remains a threat to the health and well-being of our members. We are also using a channel on YouTube for replaying services, sermons, or other recorded events. While this is an inconvenience for those who are not at ease with these platforms, it does have advantages. I have noticed that former members who moved away from us years ago have found us on Facebook, and left comments in which they have thanked us for our presence on the internet. We even have had "drop-in" viewers/worshipers from as far away as the United Kingdom and Africa. Through the magic of the internet, we can attend various services or events from the diocese or from the national church.

I would like to thank those who have been the techno-wizards on the Stream Team that make the livestreamed and recorded services possible: Tim Helton, Nancy Miller, Richard Stone, Vinita Bhushan, and Carlos Barraza. My job is to grab the links from their videos and post them on our webpage along with links to the service bulletins that Carol Browning so lovingly creates. Thanks to Maurice Hill, who edits the video of sermons, which get posted to our website along with the text of the sermons (when available). We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to Cliff Aggen for all the time and effort he put into making all our technology function seemingly effortlessly and mostly flawlessly. (There are always unforeseen "bugs" that arise in this process.)

We also are using an online interactive calendar of parish events. To access the calendar, simply click on "Monthly Calendar" under the tab "Upcoming Events." Users may download and print any part of the calendar, as well as send yourself reminders of posted events. You may also send invitations to events to friends.

We are making every effort to make certain everyone is "in the know" by sending the weekly e-news *This Week at St. Columba*'s and Constant Contact emails from our parish Office Manager, Carol Browning. If you are not receiving our emails, or if you know of anyone who would like to be included, please send an email with contact information to <a href="mailto:office.manager@stcolumbaca.com">office.manager@stcolumbaca.com</a>.

I invite each of you to take time and tour our website. Besides links to find our services, we have information posted about the church, the staff, parish calendar, recent sermons, parish history, our ministries, Vestry, how to donate, and much more. Some of the information I have posted needs to be revisited for revision, and I invite feedback so I can update what we have posted on our website. I welcome photos! If you have photos of events, email them to me and I will get them posted (within reason). In all matters, I try to keep our website up to date. Look for more changes to our website in the future and for updates on the Rector Search.

### ‡ Annual Pledge Campaign and Endowment Fund ‡



The Stewardship Committee plans and carries out the stewardship program for time, talent, and treasure for St. Columba's. The committee graciously thanks all of you in the parish who contribute your time, talent, and treasure during 2022. The pledge campaign began September 11 this year. The theme of the pledge campaign was *More Than Enough*. This year, during Sunday services, Paul Amendt and Maurice Hill shared with the congregation their personal journey with Stewardship. As a most memorable piece, Paul also entertained us by singing new lyrics to his

Stewardship song to the tune of "Memory" from the Broadway show "Cats" ... "Tithing. Tithing time, talent, and treasure...." Gail Hill gave the congregation a Narrative Budget during Sunday service. Jeff Chung strummed his ukulele and sang "Here I Am, Lord" as a stewardship song; Brett Hanley accompanied Jeff. As of January 15, 2023, we received 52 pledges for 2023 for a total of \$194,183. This includes five new member pledges and two current members who made new pledges. The total represents an average of \$3,786 per pledge; the total amount is similar to what we received by this date in 2022. However, we are still receiving pledges from parishioners. The reported pledge numbers are current as of the date of submission of this report.

The 2022 Stewardship Committee members were Nancy Miller and Maurice Hill; Carlos Barazza was the Vestry representative for Stewardship; Sarah Monroe-Allen is our Financial Secretary and Parish Pledge Secretary; and Gail Hill is Treasurer. Our interim pastor, Mark Asman, supported the committee's efforts through sermons, advice, and example. The Stewardship Committee always welcomes new members.

#### ‡ Endowment Fund ‡

St. Columba's Endowment Fund Committee was established by the Vestry in 2005. The purpose of the Committee is to implement a Planned Giving Program for St. Columba's. The 2022 committee members were Fr. Greg, Gail Hill, Tim Helton, Nancy Miller, Doug Miller, Maurice Hill, and Tom Ledsam. Susan Doswell joined the committee as CEO once Fr. Greg retired in June 2022. Gail Hill is the current Treasurer and, as such, is an *ex officio* member of the Committee.

We recognize the significant impact that Cliff Aggen has had as a founding member of the Committee. Cliff's support has been unparalleled throughout the years and we are forever grateful.

All funds in the Endowment Fund are tracked in St. Columba's monthly financial report and presented to the Vestry monthly. The monies in the Endowment Fund are held in an account

through the Los Angeles Episcopal Diocese with the "Diocesan Investment Trust" (DIT), investments in a Vanguard exchange traded fund (ETF), a Vanguard bond fund, and in a Vanguard Federal Money Market Fund at Vanguard Group (website: <a href="https://www.vanguard.com/">https://www.vanguard.com/</a>). We also hold money in the church's Bank of America account.

The Endowment Fund has money invested in the Long-Term Diversified (LTD) Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT). The DIT continues to use Wilshire Associates, a Los Angeles firm, as its investment advisor. The balance for the LTD fund on 11/30/2022 was \$307,360.09. November is the most recent date for which we have DIT statements.

The Endowment Fund Committee also invests money in the Vanguard Total Stock Market Exchange Traded Fund (symbol VTI) and Vanguard Intermediate Term Bond (symbol BIV) using a dollar-cost-averaging method of investment. These investments provide further diversification of a portion of our funds as we strive to achieve the long-term objectives of the Endowment Fund. Cash is held in a Vanguard Federal Money Market Fund (MM Fund). As of 11/30/2022, the Endowment Fund held a total of \$204,046.19 with Vanguard. This includes \$177,588.92 in VTI, \$8,792.55 in BIV, and \$17,664.72 in the MM Fund. On November 30, 2022, we held \$0 in the church's account at Bank of America, as all funds were transferred to Vanguard for investment.

In 2022, the Endowment Fund received a gift totaling \$40,000 from the estate of a parishioner, and we received notices that we would receive additional funds from this estate at a later date. We also received notice that we would receive a gift from the estate of another parish family in the near future.

The Endowment Committee recommended, and the Vestry approved, a grant from the Endowment Fund to the Church for 2023 in the amount of \$15,000. The Committee will make the money available to the Church upon request from the Vestry.

The grand total amount of the Endowment Fund as of November 30, 2022, was \$511,406.28. This includes the Long-Term Diversified Diocesan Fund, the Vanguard investments, Vanguard money market funds, and the Bank of America account funds. Similar to the entire stock market, our fund declined in 2022 (through November 2022). With the anticipated generous donations to the fund by parishioners and the improved performance of our investments, we expect a significant increase in 2023.

The purpose of the Endowment Fund is to make funds available for ministries and other activities in the future, pursuant to the enabling resolution and Plan of Operation. In 2015, the Committee developed a policy to notify the Vestry every 4th quarter concerning funds available for expenditure for the upcoming year. In 2022, the Committee recommended an Endowment Fund Grant of \$15,000. The Vestry approved this amount. Such grants are made from the Endowment Fund without invading the original principal—the total amount originally donated. The grant money comes from the money earned from our investments. The policy of the committee is to make available from 3-5 percent (of the average balance for the previous three years) or less each year.

The Endowment Committee looks forward to hosting a Thank-You Event and an Iona Society Celebration in 2023, time permitting.

We are all happy to celebrate our Iona Society members: Paul and Gail Amendt, Betty\* Angle. Nancy and Ed Miller, George and Betty\* Anderson, Ted\* and Vicky\* Daniel, Ann Radzienda, Harry\* and Marguerite\* Daubert, Steve and Michele Hauser, Jim and Mona Cecil, Nancy Hey, Jerry and Sally Gillespie, Tim and Teri Helton, Maurice and Gail Hill, Caroline\* Lescher, John and Beverly Pearson, Chuck\* and Susan Andrews, Terry\* and Gail DeWolfe, Cliff\* and Bev\* Aggen, Bill\* and Maxine\* Himstreet, Norm and Carrie\* Loughlin, George\* and Ann Luthringer, Greg\* and Lucia\* Mazza, Mary\* Madden, Norma McQuade, Tom\* and Ann\* Rosser, Bob and Gwen Waite, Joe and Sarah Wigert, and Margaret\* Sommers and Margie Miller (husband Dave). ## ‡ Rector Transition Committee Report ‡



In June of 2022, a small group of us came together as the Transition Committee to help get the parish ready to search for a new rector after the previous rector—of 22 years!—retired. Our charge was to write a new parish profile to share with prospective candidates, one that would detail how St. Columba's came to be, who we are now, and what our collective vision is for

the parish going forward.

Our committee consists of Marjo Gardner, Richard Stone, Lyle Hyde, Jeff Chung, and myself. With guidance from Fr. Tom Discavage, Canon for Formation and Transition Ministry of the Diocese of Los Angeles, we embarked on a journey of understanding and articulating who we are as a parish. After some initial planning meetings, we held a Story Day, a day-long event for everyone in the parish to meet in the parish hall and share stories about how each one of us came to St. Columba's, what some of our best memories are, and why we remain here. The day was facilitated by Fr. Tom, and a bit over 30 folks attended.

At the same time we were preparing for Story Day, we also crafted a survey for everyone in the parish to complete, to tell us what each of us likes about St. Columba's, how we might improve, and the qualities sought in the new rector. The survey was first distributed after church on November 27 and for some weeks after that, with it also being posted on the St. Columba's website and eventually mailed to parishioners that could not get one at church or via the website. Of the roughly 110 surveys that went out, 61 were returned—over 50%. We have now finished compiling the data from the surveys, and we will soon write the parish profile, have it reviewed by Fr. Tom of the Diocese and the Vestry, make whatever revisions are appropriate, and turn it over to the Search Committee that will begin advertising for rector candidates. The parish profile will also be posted on the St. Columba's website for everyone who is interested to review.



## St. Columba's Treasurer's Report



2022 ended up the year in the black! Our income was greater than our expenses by over \$10,000. Our expenses were much lower than budgeted, and we continue to have very generous parishioners! The Celtic Faire Committee, under the direction of Carol Rocco, raised the funds we needed—\$4,000. The Children's Learning Center increased their pledge to us and reimbursed us for utilities and other shared costs.

2022 was a time of a lot of changes. Fr. Greg retired and Mark started as our Interim Pastor. Mark's salary was less than budgeted. As a retiree, we didn't have to pay for benefits, including pension contributions. We figured out how to provide Mark with a car within our available funds so he could be our Interim Pastor. Our utilities ended up much less than budgeted: the Preschool is the main user of utilities right now and they totally reimbursed us.

We gave our staff pay increases in 2022. We were able to meet our pledge to the Diocese. We paid them 10% of our projected pledges.

2023 presents some new challenges. The Vestry is preparing the compensation package for a new Rector to include in the Parish Profile. The Diocese has determined some new minimum salaries that we want to match or exceed in order to get the best candidate possible. Since the new Rector will begin in the summertime, we won't have a whole year of expenses in 2023. The Vestry has reviewed the impact of those salaries on the 2023 budget and a 2024 budget with a full year of salary. We've also reviewed what housing assistance we could offer since rentals in our area run \$2,850-\$4,200 a month.

In addition, the Diocese has determined that they will start assessing us 12% of regular income beginning in 2024. As a result, we have budgeted for 2023 to pay a Mission Share Fund pledge of 11% of 2022's plate and pledge.

In other news, we received a generous donation from a parishioner's estate for the Endowment Fund. The parish received a grant from the Endowment Fund in 2022 and is expecting another one in 2023 for a total of \$35,000. That should enable the parish to do some maintenance projects totaling over \$50,000.

I wish to thank the Budget & Finance Committee for helping with the work: Bev & John Pearson, Doug Miller, and our Financial Secretary, Sarah Monroe-Allen. Cliff Aggen was a vital member of this committee for many years, and we will greatly miss his contributions to our efforts. If anyone would like to join us in this work or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. I thank each and every one of you for your generous donations to enable St. Columba's to continue its mission as an Episcopal Parish and a member of the Camarillo community. Our intent is to keep the parish vital through careful management of our finances.
