

Minutes of the Annual Meeting Sunday, January 29, 2023

The Annual Meeting of St. Columba's Episcopal Church was opened at 10:59 a.m. with prayer by Senior Warden Susan Doswell. She asked everyone to sign on the yellow pages provided and thanked those who contributed annual reports for the meeting. The transition prayer and a blessing for the food being consumed at the meeting were given by Susan Doswell.

Motion to dispense with the reading of the Minutes of the 2022 Annual Meeting was moved, seconded, and passed.

Susan recognized the CLC Board members, led by Rebecca Mendoza, and had them stand; she recognized the retiring member of the Vestry, Doug Miller, who will continue on the Vestry to fill the spot vacated by Loralee Brown's move out of state. She also recognized the Transition Committee, led by Nancy Miller, and had them stand. The Search Committee was recognized, led by Maurice Hill. The current Vestry will remain for next year, led by Susan Doswell as Senior Warden. Brett Hanley accompanied us in singing "Happy Birthday" to George Anderson.

Bob and Gwen Waite will serve as Diocesan Delegates for 2023, and Maurice and Gill will be alternates. It was moved and seconded that these parishioners serve in these capacities; the motion passed.

Mark Asman presented the Vestry nominees. He said that, during the time of transition, the current Vestry should be kept in place for stability. Our bylaws require the Vestry to be composed of 9 to 12 members. There are currently two open slots to meet that requirement. He presented Lara Tyas and Deborah Brown as candidates. Gail Hill moved and Teri Helton seconded that these two nominees be accepted as new Vestry members for upcoming three-year terms; the motion passed.

It was moved by Barbara Amick and seconded by Bob Waite that Presentation of Annual Reports be accepted by title; the motion passed.

Treasurer Gail Hill presented the Budget, assisted by Maurice Hill, on PowerPoint. We received more income than expenses. Utilities were lower than expected; Mark's salary was less than anticipated. Air conditioning is being added to parish hall offices; the back double doors and kitchen door are being replaced. We now must prepare for five months with the new full-time rector, hoping we find someone with five to nine years' experience at the recommended \$74,000 salary. Overall, we are in good shape, and appreciation for continued support was expressed. Complete financial information was included in the Report for all to review. Barbara Amick thanked Gail for her dedication.

Susan Doswell prayed for and mentioned all who died this past year. Susan recognized Mark and thanked him for answering the call to come to St. Columba's as our Interim Pastor. Susan acknowledged the leadership skills used in filling in for Cliff Aggen's role at St. Columba's, notably Gail Hill (financial matters); Carlos Barraza (protocols); Maurice Hill (Food Pantry, Project Hope, and Stewardship campaign); and Tim Helton (IT).

Additionally, Susan thanked Laura Jones for making 40 watch caps for the International Mariners Center in Port Hueneme, and Jeanette Barcroft for Labyrinth landscaping.


Mark said we are near the halfway point in the 18-month process of finding a new rector. Next, the Transition Committee will forward the Parish Profile to the Vestry, and then the Search Committee will take three to five months to discern rector candidates. Finally, the rector will be chosen and terms of agreement will be negotiated. The new rector may need two months to wrap up things at his/her present parish. The call is not the end result; we need to help the new priest land successfully using our onboarding skills.

At this time, Susan Doswell commissioned the new Vestry—Paul Amendt, Carlos Barraza, Marjo Gardner, Teri Helton, Marianne Hyde, Doug Miller, Lara Tyas, Deborah Brown, and Susan Doswell.

As there was no further business, Teri Helton moved that the meeting be adjourned at noon, seconded; the motion passed.

Mark led us in a closing prayer.

+ Columbarium +



The columbarium serves as a repository and testament for many of the lives that blessed and enriched our parish life. The columbarium has a total of 120 niches of which 86 have been contracted for. To date, sixty-one parishioners have been inured in the columbarium. The columbarium committee consists of Carlos Barraza, Susan Doswell, Gail Hill and Maria Fernandez.

The columbarium fund ended the year with \$5,206.18 after \$34,963.81 was transferred to interest-earning T-bills in October 2023.

Historically, burial inside the church was once reserved to honor noteworthy clerics and nobles. Now it is possible to grant this blessing to all God's children to "dwell in the house of the Lord forever." Liturgically, it sets aside a place for remembrance and love for the departed. At \$1200, the cost of the niche is modest compared to a burial plot and is ecologically sound. + Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors + + Storytellers +



A **Eucharistic Minister** is a lay person authorized to administer the Consecrated Elements at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist. A Eucharistic Minister should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith. [Canons of the General Convention, Title III, Canon 4, Section 6]

Canon 4, Section 1 (a) specifies that this ministry is open to confirmed communicants in good standing and that they are licensed by the Bishop and under the direction of the Clergy in charge of the congregation.

The Eucharistic Minister leads the Intercessions (Prayers of the People) and helps with communion by administering the chalice for Communion.

Currently active and licensed Eucharistic Ministers are Paul Amendt, Deborah Brown, Bill Brown, Mary Steppes-Cole, Maria Fernandez, Teri Helton, Marianne Hyde, Nancy Miller, and Bob Waite.



Lectors are lay persons appointed by the Rector to assist in worship by reading the Old Testament Lesson and the Epistle, as well as by leading the recitation of the Psalm.

Currently, active Lectors are Paul Amendt, Mary Steppes-Cole, Marjo Gardner, Maurice Hill, Diane Off, Lara Tyas, and Maria Fernandez.

Our **Biblical Storytellers** have been trained by the Rev. Dr Dina Ferguson, past President of the Network of Biblical Storytellers, using a method known as "Scripture by Heart." The goal is to present the text of the appointed Lesson without referring to written text or notes—and to do it accurately as to both the Storytelling text itself and the story being told. There is no requirement that the

presentations be dramatic, although they can be; the primary difference between a Lector's and a Storyteller's presentations is the immediacy of the words, without a lectern between the Storyteller and the congregation. + The Labyrinth +

We have been doing this to make better choir, organ, piano live recordings and amplifying. The staff, School Board, and I have continued our mission to make St. Columba's Children's Learning Center Camarillo's premier Christian-based program.

This year, we fully enjoyed having the additional outdoor space. Outdoor play continues to provide essential support for children's health and wellness, including brain development, social and emotional development, appropriate risk

assessment, gross and fine motor development, coordination, and self-confidence. This year we added shades to each outdoor space that was at no cost to the preschool. All labor and materials we donated.

Our major social events were well attended by staff, parents, family members and friends. Everyone enjoyed Back to School Night at the beginning of the year where the teachers introduced themselves and set goals with parents. Trunk-or-Treat was once again a huge success for all. This year we once again had our very own pumpkin patch and it continues to be a huge success! We were able to celebrate the Harvest Festival/Pumpkin Patch for two weeks and the children were able to participate in so many fun events. The Christmas Program and Holiday Bundt Cake Sale were not only well received, but also the school's

biggest fundraiser of the year, thank you for your continued support, Church. We have continued to hold events where we participate in conjunction with the Church, in doing so we are building a strong partnership.

Our summer program was once again a hit! Many families stayed throughout the summer and enjoyed the activities we provided. This year we did not have room to accept any new families from other programs, as we continue to stay full with our own. Over the summer each week the classes had different "camps." We offered Art Camp, Safari Camp, Ocean Camp, Fun in the Sun, and so many other camps. We transformed the classes into underwater adventures, castles, camping grounds and much more!

CLC is in a good financial position, and has continued to have positive cash flow. Enrollment has continued to stay full for the 2023-24 school year. Some of the major projects we were able to accomplish this school year were replacing the old shed with a larger and more durable shed. We had all water faucets tested for lead which is required by Community Care Licensing. The school also provides a monthly pledge of \$1950 per month to the Church.

Our teaching staff consists of ten teachers. I have continued to attend meetings with local Preschool Directors Group allowing me to network, offer and receive support, information and maintain genuine friendship. Our goal is to maintain a healthy, safe and most of all loving environment for anyone who walks through our gates including children, their families and most of all our loving staff who go above and beyond for the school and community, building the reputation in town of a program that exceeds all expectations.

I want to thank all of the St. Columba's Church and our wonderful School Board Members for their knowledge, patience, support and dedication over the past year– I could not have done my job without all of you!

% Children's Ministries

The goal of the Children's Ministries Programs at St. Columba's is to involve adults and children in a common religious experience in which the primary values of childhood are predominate, especially those of simplicity, contemplation and joy.

"Catechesis" is formation in the Christian faith through interpersonal relationship under the quidance of the Holy Spirit.

In the St. Columba's Atria, the catechists are guides and the children are invited to respond rather than have religious information "poured in" into their heads.

At St. Columba's, the children's formation program is *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd*.

MINISTRIES Based on the Montessori philosophy of education, the *Catechesis* program is divided into three levels of three-year cycles that correspond to the physical and mental development of children. Throughout the three cycles, the child is presented with the essentials of our faith in increasing detail and sophistication. Celebrations or para-liturgies (Advent, Epiphany, Liturgy of the Light, and Pentecost) are held in the Atria throughout the liturgical year.

The 2023 year was one of many difficult scheduling challenges involving Catechist availability. The cancelation of presentations with classes from the St. Columba's Preschool continued.

In the atria, the year was one of continuing to update and fill in the materials (resources), primarily for the Level III *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* atrium in preparation for young adults being presented at Confirmation which is being done in conjunction with Mount Cross's Confirmation class. With the help of parents, and being very flexible week to week, presentations were given in each atrium.

The Level I presentations continued to include Parable of the Good Shepherd, Psalm 23 vs 1-3, the Parables of the Kingdom of God Re: the Mustard Seed and the Grain of Wheat, and the presentation of Baptism, when we come to belong to the Good Shepherd.

In the Level III Atrium, we continued to explore more of the specifics of The People of God and *The Plan of God* and God's plan of Cosmic Communion at the Parousia, "a time when God will be all in all." In February, we began our reading of the Old Testament Scriptures, reading and reflecting upon the 2 stories of The Creation and story of Adam & Eve in the Garden, and how they inform us about our relationship with God, the time of Redemption (since the birth of Jesus), and the Parousia.

Building a spiritual community for children, as with adults, requires commitment. As a Christian Formation program, the *Catechesis of the Good Shepherd* requires the same kinds of commitments: primarily a commitment on the part of the catechist, to be present, and on the part of the parents and child to have the child in the "Atrium" or classroom on a regular basis. My sincere apologies for my personal life getting in the way of my being present in the atria. Many thanks to our parents who struggle with early morning time crunches, scheduling conflicts, no free days, and who see that their children do come on a regular basis to class.

Future needs will continue to focus on bringing new people with children into our parish so our program may grow. If you are interested, there are two ways to participate. And I am eager to train interested people as an assistants for the atrium. Additionally, I would love to speak with any individuals who are willing to help us by making materials that are used week after week.

I invite you to become more like a child. To come, see, explore, learn more about Jesus, the Kingdom of God and The Plan of God by doing Christian Formation with us!

St. Columba's Food Ministries D



Project Hope Pantry for Seniors and Families, St. Columba's Pantry and Emergency Need Pantry, are all part of the food ministries at St Columba's. All food ministries at St. Columba's receive donations of funds and grocery items from our parish members, Food Share, neighboring churches, friends in the community, as well as funds from the City of Camarillo through a HUD Federal Grant. We are a partner in the Food Share Network and Feeding America. We continue to be ready to serve those who come to us in need of assistance. All

people are welcome to receive food from any of our food ministries. We always accept grocery donations and cash or checks.

We provide food on the first, second and fourth Thursday of each month. Project Hope provides food in the morning and afternoon on the 2nd and 4th Thursday. St. Columba's Pantry provides food on the first Thursday afternoon. Food is also delivered to seniors who do not have transportation. Emergency Food is available when the Church office is open. Carol Browning, our Office Manager, graciously meets clients in the office and provides them with needed grocery items.

The Food Ministries distributed staples, canned and dried food, bread, produce, and as available, fresh produce, and fresh and frozen protein items. Typically, we serve about 45 families on each distribution day. The number is rising: we have recently been serving up to 65 families. Special thanks to those who work faithfully on our Food Ministries and have made sure that it supports the community. Food and supplies pick-up at Food Share Warehouse on Tuesday mornings: George Anderson and Maurice Hill. Bag layout, food inventory set-up on Wednesdays: George Anderson and Doug Miller. Thursday mornings for bag packing and parking lot distribution to client's cars: George Anderson, Doug Miller, Judith Laurentowski, Marjo Gardner, Michele Hauser, and Fran Cogswell. The Thursday morning delivery crew for seniors without transportation: Judith Laurentowski, Fran Cogswell, Michele Hauser, and Marjo Gardner. The Thursday afternoon/evening distributors: Doug Miller, Gene Doswell, Lyle & Marianne Hyde, Richard Stone, and Amanda & Amaya Meyer. Special thanks for their super support: The Boy Scouts of Troop 262 and Carlos Barraza for their annual food drive with the food being given to Food Share; The congregations of local churches for food and monetary donations: Trinity Presbyterian, Mount Cross Lutheran, Peace Lutheran, and Camarillo United Methodist; the CROP Walk and individual monetary donors; members of the community for their monetary donations; Food Share and HUD for most of the food that we distributed.

For Thanksgiving and Christmas, we gave gift cards to our seniors and younger families. At Christmas, we gave gift cards to seniors and families. The money for the gift cards was provided by St. Columba's Food Ministries funds and a generous parishioner. Our parishioners gave Christmas gifts to the children of our food ministries.

Stcolumbaca.com and Electronic Communications



Since August 18, 2006, the St. Columba's website has undergone many changes. On that date, *This Week at St. Columba*'s began its life, with a weekly publication of events in the parish as well as from the wider church as well. The number of our email subscribers has increased considerably since our beginning.

In 2017, we rebuilt the entire website with a new hosting service. It is now more streamlined and much easier to edit and maintain. As a result, when new information is known, the website may be quickly revised. We can also add almost unlimited pages. Our website has continued to evolve to meet the changing needs of the community and the changing world with respect to the COVID pandemic. In response, we discontinued in-person services, opting for livestreamed services via Facebook and YouTube. When health officials declared it safe, St. Columba's returned to in-person worship services while keeping the format of livestreamed Spiritual Communion. We discovered a new mission—namely, to continue livestreaming most of our services, and recording others for on-demand viewing. By doing so, we are reaching parishioners who are unable to attend in person, and we are reaching out to others around the world who have found our online presence. We will continue this hybrid format of worship as long as COVID remains a threat to the health and wellbeing of our members. Thankfully, with the features of the Facebook platform, we can livestream services or pre-record them. We are also using a channel on YouTube for replaying services, sermons, or other recorded events. I have noticed that former members who moved away from us years ago have found us on Facebook, and left comments in which they have thanked us for our presence on the internet. We even have had "drop-in" viewer/worshipers from as far away as the United Kingdom. Through the magic of the internet, we can attend various services or events from the diocese or from the national church.

Thanks to a generous donation, we were able to construct a cabinet to permanently house our livestream equipment, so it is more readily available.

I would like to thank those who have been the techno-wizards that make the livestreamed and recorded services possible: Tim Helton, Nancy Miller, Richard Stone, Vinita Bhushan, Bill Hillbrant, and Michella Harp. My job is to grab the links from their video and post them on our webpage along with links to the service bulletins that Carol Browning so lovingly creates. Thanks to Maurice Hill, who edits the video of sermons, which get posted to our website along with the text (when it is available) of the sermons.

We also are using an online interactive calendar of Parish events. To access the calendar, simply click on "Monthly Calendar" under the tab "Upcoming Events." Users may download and print any part of the calendar, as well as send yourself reminders of posted events. You may also send invitations to events to friends.

Zoom remains a platform we continue to use for some meetings.

We are making every effort to make certain everyone is "in the know" by sending the weekly e-news "This Week at St. Columba's" and Constant Contact emails from our parish Office Manager, Carol Browning. If you are not receiving our emails, or if you know of anyone who would like to be included, please send an email with contact information to office.manager@stcolumbaca.com. Interested individuals may also sign up for Constant Contact emails for "This Week at St. Columba's" by using the form on the "Welcome" page https://stcolumbaca.com/.

I invite each of you to take time and tour our website. Besides links to find our services, we have information posted about the church, the staff, parish calendar, recent sermons, parish history, our ministry, Vestry, how to donate, and much more. **Some of the information I have posted needs to be revisited for revision**, and I invite feedback so I can update what we have posted on our website. I welcome photos! If you have photos of events, email them to me and I will get them posted (within reason). In all matters, I try to keep our website up to date.

‡ Annual Pledge Campaign and Endowment Fund ‡



The Stewardship Committee plans and carries out the stewardship program for time, talent, and treasure for St. Columba's. The committee graciously thanks all of you in the parish who contributed your time, talent, and treasure during 2023. The annual pledge campaign began September 17 this year. The theme of the pledge campaign was *Rooted in Abundance*. This year, during Sunday services, Teri Helton and Michele Hauser shared with the congregation their

personal journey with Stewardship. Gail Hill presented the congregation with a Narrative Budget during a Sunday service. As of January 17, 2024, we received 47 pledges for 2023 for a total of \$208,244.00. The total represents an average of \$4,430 per pledge; the *total* amount is about \$14,200 higher as compared to what we received by this date in 2023. However, we are still receiving pledges from parishioners. The reported pledge numbers are current as of the date of submission of this report.

The 2023 Stewardship Committee members were Nancy Miller and Maurice Hill; Sarah Monroe Allen is our Financial Secretary and Parish Pledge Secretary; and Gail Hill is Treasurer. Our interim pastor, Mark Asman, supported the committee's efforts through sermons, advice, and example, as did the Rev. Susan Klein. The Stewardship Committee always welcomes new members.

‡ Endowment Fund ‡

St. Columba's Endowment Fund Committee was established by the Vestry in 2005. The purpose of the Committee is to implement a Planned Giving Program for St. Columba's. The 2023 committee members were Susan Doswell, Gail Hill, Tim Helton, Nancy Miller, Doug Miller, Maurice Hill, and Tom Ledsam. Susan Doswell joined the committee as CEO once Fr. Greg retired in June 2022. Our new Rector, Michael Anderson, will serve on the committee in 2024. Gail Hill is the current Treasurer and, as such, is an *ex officio* member of the Committee.

In 2023, the Endowment Fund received a very generous donation from the estate of Caroline Lescher in the amount of \$220,000, and a very generous donation from the Ted and Vicky Daniel estate in the amount of \$40,000. These gifts will allow the committee to make much larger annual grants to the Church in the future.

All funds in the Endowment Fund are tracked in St. Columba's monthly financial report and presented to the Vestry monthly. The monies in the Endowment Fund are held in an account through the Los Angeles Episcopal Diocese with the "Diocesan Investment Trust" (DIT), investments in a Vanguard exchange traded fund (ETF), a Vanguard bond fund, and in a Vanguard Federal Money Market Fund at Vanguard Group (website: https://www.vanguard.com/). We also hold money in the church's Bank of America account.

The committee voted to use Ridgeline Private Wealth Management to invest a portion of the fund (\$500,000) starting in December 2023. The committee oversees the account and makes decisions on the types and amounts of investments in accordance with our Plan of Operation. The firm manages and invests for us.

The Endowment Fund has money invested in the Long-Term Diversified (LTD) Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT). The DIT continues to use Wilshire Associates, a Los Angeles firm, as its investment advisor. The balance for the LTD fund on 11/30/2023 was \$325,384.54. November is the most recent date for which we have DIT statements.

The Endowment Fund Committee also invests money in the Vanguard Total Stock Market Exchange Traded Fund (symbol VTI) and Vanguard Intermediate Term Bond (symbol BIV). These investments provide further diversification of a portion of our funds as we strive to achieve the long-term objectives of the Endowment Fund. Cash is held in a Vanguard Federal Money Market Fund (MM Fund) and Ridgeline. As of 12/31/2023, the Endowment Fund held a total of \$10,023.80 with Vanguard. This includes \$5,406.12 in VTI, \$0 in BIV, and \$4,617.68 in the MM Fund. The Vanguard account was reduced in December because we sold shares to transfer funds to Ridgeline. On December 31, 2023, we held \$0 in the church's account at Bank of America, as all funds were transferred to Ridgeline for investment.

On December 31, 2023, we held \$508,187.20 with Ridgeline. This money (about half) came from the two large donations and the remaining amount came from the sale of Vanguard ETF and Bond ETF shares.

The Endowment Committee will recommend for approval a grant from the Endowment Fund to the church for 2024 in January 2024. The Committee will make the money available to the church upon request from the Vestry.

The grand total amount of the Endowment Fund as of November 30, 2023, was about \$840,000. This includes the Long-Term Diversified Diocesan Fund, the Vanguard investments, Vanguard money market funds, Bank of America account funds, and Ridgeline investments. The total includes data from the DIT for November; we had not received the December DIT statement by the time of publication of this report. The final year-end total will likely be higher, since the S & P and other markets rose about 4 percent in December.

The purpose of the Endowment Fund is to make funds available for ministries and other activities in the future, pursuant to the enabling resolution and Plan of Operation. In 2015, the Committee developed a policy to notify the Vestry every 4th quarter concerning funds available for expenditure for the upcoming year. Such grants are made from the Endowment Fund without invading the original principal—the total amount originally donated. The grant money comes from the money earned from our investments. The policy of the committee is to make available from 3 - 5 percent (of the average balance for the previous three years) or less each year.

The Endowment Committee looks forward to hosting an Iona Society Celebration in 2024, time permitting.

We are all happy to celebrate our *Iona Society* members: Paul & Gail Amendt, Betty* Angle, Nancy & Ed Miller, George & Betty* Anderson, Ted* & Vicky* Daniel, Ann Radzienda, Harry* & Marguerite* Daubert, Steve & Michele Hauser, Jim & Mona Cecil, Nancy Hey, Jerry & Sally* Gillespie, Tim & Teri Helton, Maurice & Gail Hill, Caroline* Lescher, John & Beverly Pearson, Chuck* & Susan Andrews, Terry* & Gail DeWolfe, Cliff* & Bev* Aggen, Bill* & Maxine* Himstreet, Norm & Carrie* Loughlin, George* & Ann Luthringer, Greg* & Lucia* Mazza, Mary* Madden, Norma McQuade, Tom* & Ann* Rosser, Bob & Gwen Waite, Joe and & Sarah Wigert, Margaret Sommers* and Margie Miller (husband Dave). ‡ Senior Warden's Report ‡



The beginning of 2023 found St. Columba's six months into our transition period while in search for a new Rector. In consultation with Fr. Tom Quijada-Discavage from the Diocesan Office of Formation and Transition, our Vestry and Transition and Search Committees stood poised to do the work required for the search. The Transition Committee created a Parish Profile, leading to our job posting from late April to late June. In July, the Search Committee began their intense review and interview process.

At the end of October, The Reverend Doctor Michael P. Anderson accepted our call to serve as Rector at St. Columba's, and his employment here will begin in January 2024.

Early in 2023, a committee was formed to evaluate and implement protocols for oversight of daily operations of the parish, and to date, every aspect of parish life has been addressed. Lay Eucharistic Ministers, Altar Guild, Lectors, Ushers, Vestry members, Livestreaming Team, Health Ministers, Buildings & Grounds folks, and countless others have taken on extra duties and responsibilities facilitating worship, maintenance, and administration of St. Columba's.

Our food distribution programs, Project Hope and Food Pantry, continued to provide food for families and seniors throughout the year, in spite of budget cuts and rising food prices.

We enjoyed combined services with our friends at Mount Cross Lutheran Church and Camarillo United Methodist Church.

We have thrived under the loving and wise guidance of our Interim Pastor, The Rev. Canon Mark Asman. We had contracted with Mark for a year, beginning mid-August 2022, and he graciously consented to stay for two more months.

In late October, we welcomed The Rev. Susan Klein as our second Interim Pastor, and she served with us until the end of the year. Susan, too, was a constant inspiration to us throughout the holy seasons of Advent and Christmas and in our final preparations for our new Rector.

We continue to pray daily for those who have entrusted us to do so.

Although our journey through this transition has been long and challenging, ultimately it has been inspiring and enlightening. We are prepared for new and vibrant leadership in Fr. Michael Anderson, coming to us in January 2024.

St. Columba's Treasurer's Report



2023 ended up the year in the black! Our income was greater than our expenses by over \$49,000. We had budgeted for a new Rector to join us mid-year and Fr. Michael Anderson is not joining us until January 2024. Our parishioners were very generous, giving us \$27,000 more than they pledged!

As you all have heard, we will use every dollar of that generosity in the next several years. 2023 primarily focused on determining that we could afford a new

Rector, searching for that Rector, and then providing a salary and benefits package that was appropriate. Rev. Mark Asman continued as our Interim Pastor with a salary less than budgeted. As a retiree, we didn't have to pay for his benefits, including pension contributions. Rev. Susan Klein joined us in the fall. She had the same financial benefits as she is also a retired priest.

We were able to meet our pledge to the Diocese. We paid them 11% of 2022's pledges and plate. The Diocese is starting to assess parishes 12% of all income used for Normal Operating expenses. As we have never based our pledge on that number, it is a large jump in what we are expected to send to the Diocese. As of this date, we have asked the Diocese for relief for 2024 to pay them a lesser amount, about what we sent in 2023.

2024 is an exciting time in the parish with Fr. Michael joining us. Financially, we will continue to face challenges. Right now, we are projecting to use about half of our Reserves (excess from past years like the \$49,000 from 2023) to pay for the increased salary and benefits necessary to attract and retain Fr. Michael and his wonderful large family. We're solvent but continue to need support from each one of you. We believe that the Holy Spirit is with us!

In other news, the generous donation from a parishioner's estate for the Endowment Fund has been fully invested. We spent the Endowment grant from 2021 and part of the grant from 2022 on updating the Rector's office and the Sacristy bathroom. The rest of the grants from 2022 and 2023 will be spent on projects that are needed. Another grant for 2024 should be forthcoming.

We audited the books for the parish and the Children's Learning Center. Anne Waite Thille and Amanda Meyer kindly did the work for free. It was a more extensive audit than we've done for a few years. We were also successful in getting the church non-profit status with the State of California, something we should have done before. It was necessary to continue applying for the HUD grants for the food ministry.

I wish to thank the Budget & Finance Committee for helping with the work: Bev Pearson, Doug Miller, Maria Fernandez, and our Financial Secretary, Sarah Monroe-Allen. John Pearson was a long-time member of this committee and is greatly missed. If anyone would like to join us in this work or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. I thank each and every one of you for your generous donations to enable St. Columba's to continue its mission as an Episcopal Parish and a member of the Camarillo community. Our intent is to keep the parish vital through careful management of our finances.
