From the Rector

In the third Installment of the Indiana Jones Trilogy, *Indiana Jones and the Last Crusade*, the explorer Indiana Jones ("Indy") sets out to rescue his father, Henry, a medievalist who has vanished while searching for the Holy Grail. In this quest, Indy is accompanied by an associate of questionable loyalty, Doctor Elsa Schneider, who is secretly collaborating with the Nazis to acquire the Holy Grail, which is ironically a source of power that will allow the Nazis to conquer the world.

Toward the end, Indy and Henry are forced to locate the temple which contains the Grail. Thankfully, they successfully acquire the Grail and free themselves of their Nazi captors. Elsa, however, attempts to escape with the Grail, triggering an earthquake. In the chaos, the Grail falls into a crevice, resting on a ledge. Just before she falls into the same crevice, Indy grabs Elsa by the hand. Alas, Elsa is seduced by the power of the Grail, and, despite Indy's many pleas that he needs both of her hands, she attempts to reach the Grail with her free hand and tragically slips out of Indy's grip, falling into the dark crevice.

At this point, another tremor hits and Indy, too, falls into the same crevice and is likewise seized by his father. As with Elsa, Indy is drawn to the Grail and attempts to reach for it, nearly suffering the same fate. Unlike Elsa, however, Indy is convinced by his father to give up the Grail and to let it be, allowing Indy to use both of his hands to grip his father as he is pulled out of the crevice to safety. Indy, Henry, and their friends all ride off into the proverbial sunset.

This is a helpful object lesson for our spiritual life. Like Indiana and, sadly, Elsa, we frequently strive for those things which inhibit our ability to receive life. I speak of the gift of life that is a gift freely given by God but which we cannot possibly receive while our hearts and our hands are full to capacity with other things of which we dare not let go.

Our Gospel reading on Sunday, October 13, was the story of the young rich man who asks Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life? After giving confirmation that he has followed the law, Jesus responds, "You lack one thing; go, sell what you own, and give the money to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven; then come, follow me." The text says that the man went away grieving because he "had many possessions."

Tethering this man in this story were the things from which the Spirit must pry open his vice-like grip one finger at a time, leaving his hands empty and free to stop grasping in order to receive. Each of us, too, are tethered and weighed down by the things we carry around with us as markers of our importance, our value, and guarantors of our security. We suppose that by gathering and gripping them, we are proving our worth and enhancing our prospects in this world and possibly the next: power, reputation, influence, career achievements, respectability, and popularity.

All these, and many others besides, can and do tether people, holding us back from being able to receive what is already ours in Christ, and which can, therefore, only ever be had as a gift freely given and freely received. This is the work of the Holy Spirit, helping us to open our hearts and our hands to be free at last, to be filled with and to hold on to the unimaginable Gift of Life in all its fullness that God has in store for us instead.

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From the Treasurer

We continue to have a negative balance for the month and the year, but we continue to be at or below budgeted expenses. As you may remember, the 2024 budget deficit was projected to be \$58,000, because of the increase in expenses from having a full-time rector. To date, we only have a deficit of under \$20,000. The Children's Learning Center has graciously given us excess money to help bridge part of this budget gap!! We are still planning to use reserves, including the excess funds from 2023 and past years, and fundraising to cover the remaining deficit. You are all very generous, giving extra gifts when you can!

The Vestry, under Fr. Michael's leadership, continues to work on fundraising ideas and events. The Oktoberfest was a big success! We hope to net about \$2,500! This is half of what we wanted to fundraise for the year! The Celtic Christmas Faire is imminent on November 2 and 3. Please bring your family and friends to join us for these events!!

The Buildings & Grounds Committee has been busy! There's a plan to tent the church and all of the buildings for termites. They're still diligently working to get a bid to repair the damage from the hives of bees above the sacristy and on that roof. The work isn't easy because of the location. The Committee is also working on other projects that need to be done. All the funds for these projects are coming from Designated Funds, not the budget that we use to pay salaries and normal operating expenses. And the CLC has also donated funds for some projects near their entrance in the rear of the church. We thank them profusely for those funds!

Part of these Designated Funds are grants from the Endowment Fund that can be spent on ministries or Buildings & Grounds projects. Right now, we have a total of \$59,000 that we can spend on repairs and improvements! This is a good start to pay for what needs to be done.

It's not scary to us; it's an exciting time in our life as a parish! Everyone paying your pledge enables us to stay afloat, plan for the future, and support the work of our parish here in Camarillo! This can never be repeated enough: We continue to bless each of you as we count your pledge on Sundays or receive it via PayPal. You are all helping to support our efforts as we continue the work that God intends for us.

We'll be starting work on the 2025 Budget soon. Stay tuned for more details.

If anyone would like to join us on the Budget & Finance Committee or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. We can truly use more help, thoughts, and ideas. We want to be transparent with expenses and income. If you would like to see the most recent Financial Report, please just ask. We don't take anyone and their contributions for granted. Thank you all!

The meditative singing of simple refrains repeated many times allows the words—often as simple as "Jesus, remember me when you come into your kingdom"—to truly settle into our hearts.
