From the Rector

Advent: Reclaiming the Season of Expectation

The clocks have gone back, the days are shorter, and the church furnace has been turned up. And the Christian Church is preparing to mark the new beginning of its year, NOT (as you might think) with Christmas, but, several weeks earlier, with the arrival of Advent, the season of waiting.

What Advent urges us to await and look forward to is not Christmas (as many suppose). Rather Advent is producing in us a yearning for the final fulfilment of God's promise to "make all things new." We assume a posture of waiting for God to bring the world and our lives at last into the fullness of God's kingdom.

The story of that fulfilment begins with Christmas—with the light that comes into the world and shines in the world's darkness. But it does not end with Christmas. Advent reminds us that the events of the Christmas story are part of something much bigger. If we would appreciate the meaning of Christmas itself, we need to keep this bigger picture in our sights. Advent is about hope and looking forward to something that is still very much to come. It is an adjustment of our perspective, lifting our gaze from a preoccupation with the past and fascination with the trials of the present, and insisting again that we must see all of this in the light of what God has promised which is yet to come.

Advent poses a challenge to our current underdeveloped communal aptitude for waiting. We just do not have to wait for very many things all that often. And for those few things which require waiting, there is plenty to distract from the waiting. However, Advent is an invitation to "dwell" in the experience of waiting. An experience to which we are not very accustomed.

Wider society has next to no interest in it, concentrating instead on full exploitation of the commercial opportunities of December 25th and New Year's. And even in the life of the church, the emphasis placed on Christmas has tended to creep ever earlier into December, eating into the weeks set aside in the church calendar for this vital "rebooting" of our spiritual system.

That shift may be good news for shopkeepers and for restauranteurs hoping to profit from sustained demand, but it's a distinct challenge to Christians in their attempts to disentangle themselves from all that. Advent is an opportunity to relocate ourselves in time, to realize that we are living in the *time between*. Advent contains within itself the crucial balance of the now and the not-yet that our faith requires. As Saint Paul reminds us, in that time between we "ourselves are hidden with Christ in God; when Christ who is our life appears, then we also will appear with him glory" (Col. 3:3-4). During this season, may the Spirit remind us of our location in Christ and in the in-between.

From the Treasurer

We continue to have a significant negative balance for the month and the year, but we continue to be at or below budgeted expenses. The 2024 budget deficit was projected to be \$58,000, but we're hoping for closer to \$30,000 in the red. To date, we have a deficit of under \$22,000. We want to thank the Children's Learning Center again for their gracious excess donation to help bridge part of this budget gap!! We are still planning to use reserves, including the excess funds from 2023 and past years, and fundraising to cover the remaining deficit. You are all very generous, giving extra gifts when you can!

The fundraising has been very successful this year! The Oktoberfest and Celtic Christmas Faire were both big successes! It looks like we will net over the \$5,000 budgeted from the two events! We really appreciate everyone's hard work and support of these events.

The Buildings & Grounds Committee is still busy! The area where the bees were above the sacristy has had a new roof installed which should eliminate the problem. The church and all of the buildings are being tented the week of Thanksgiving for termites. Then additional roof repairs will take place on the church building. The Committee is working on other projects that need to be done. All the funds for these projects are coming from Designated Funds, not the budget that we use to pay salaries and normal operating expenses. And the CLC has also donated funds for some projects near their entrance in the rear of the church. We thank them profusely for those funds!

Part of these Designated Funds are grants from the Endowment Fund that can be spent on ministries or Buildings & Grounds projects. Right now, we have a total of \$59,000 we can spend on repairs and improvements! The three projects mentioned above will spend about \$46,000 of this year's grant. This is a good start to pay for what needs to be done. We are so blessed to have our Endowment Fund and give thanks for everyone who has donated to it.

We continue to bless each of you as we count your pledge on Sundays or receive it via PayPal. We're doing this together to maintain our church family, grow it to spread God's love, and continue the work that God intends for us to do.

We've started work on the 2025 Budget, and you heard more about it during my Narrative Budget presentation.

If anyone would like to join us on the Budget & Finance Committee or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. We can truly use more help, thoughts, and ideas. We want to thank Doug Miller, who has relocated, for all of his support and ideas! We want to be transparent with expenses and income. If you would like to see the most recent Financial Report, please just ask. We don't take anyone and their contributions for granted. Thank you all!

It is fall. Not fall of the year, but the number of times that one in four U.S. adults over 65 and older report falling in any given year.

What is your emergency plan? Have a plan that you have made while you were healthy and could think calmly and clearly. Have someone you trust to assist you with transportation or recuperation. That person could be the person named to make your health care decisions if you are unable to make decisions yourself. This designation requires a legal, notarized document called a durable power of attorney for health care. Such documents are available online and you can download free forms at <u>https://www.caringinfo.org/</u>.

There are several companies that make medical alert systems, and help is available at the touch of a button. They are available with a FALL ALERT app. The devices with this feature sense that you've fallen and help is on the way.

Take a body survey, if, after a fall, you are able. Can you wiggle your toes and feel everything? Did you hit your head or lose consciousness? Are you cut and bleeding? CALL 911, even if you think you're okay, even if you didn't hit your head and you don't have pain and can move everything, says Dr. Julia Webb, an interventional physiatrist at Harvard-affiliated Spaulding Rehabilitation Hospital. She specializes in non-surgical treatment for back and neck pain, which often results from falls and fractures, and says it's reasonable to call your primary care doctor and ask if an appointment is necessary. Dr. Webb says, "Watch for symptoms that may appear later, such as headaches, dizziness, imbalance, muscle weakness or numbness, difficulty speaking, feeling faint, changes in bladder or bowel function, sore muscles or joints, neck or back pain, or blurry vision. Call your doctor to report the symptoms immediately."

Do you have grab bars installed in the bathroom? Do you help your body wake by sitting up a few seconds, then standing a few seconds and taking a few seconds before walking? Do you use your cane or walking stick or walker to keep you steady on your feet? Check out *Harvard Special Health Report*, "Preventing Falls," <u>https://www.health.harvard.edu/staying-healthy/preventing-falls</u>.

It's never too early to be prepared.
