#### Minutes of the Annual Meeting Sunday, February 4, 2024

The Annual Meeting of St. Columba's Episcopal Church was called to order at 11:28 a.m. by the Rector, Fr. Michael Anderson, on his second Sunday at the church. Brett Hanley, our Music Director, led us in singing "We All Are One in Mission." Fr. Michael offered an opening prayer, and he welcomed those present to the meeting.

Teri Helton moved to dispense with the reading of the Minutes of the Annual Meeting, January 29, 2023. Jarrel Fuller seconded the motion, and it passed.

Fr. Michael thanked Rebecca Mendoza for her fine work and dedication as Director of the Children's Learning Center and recognized the members of the CLC Board. Fr. Michael also recognized the members of the Transition and Search Committees, the Buildings & Grounds Committee, the Monday Morning Work Group, and our Music Director, Brett Hanley.

Nancy Miller moved that Teri Helton be elected to serve as delegate to Diocesan Convention and Gail Hill and Maurice Hill be elected to serve as alternate delegates to Convention. Jarrel Fuller seconded the motion, and it passed. We were asked to pray for discernment in the selection and election of a second delegate.

Outgoing Vestry members, Carlos Barraza and Doug Miller, were thanked for their service. Deborah Brown moved that Maurice Hill and Tom Ledsam be elected to serve on the Vestry. Nancy Miller seconded the motion, and it passed. Fr. Michael announced that Susan Doswell and Teri Helton will continue in the capacity of Sr. Warden and Jr. Warden, respectively, for 2024. Fr. Michael expressed gratitude to Gail Hill for her dedication and expertise exemplified in her service as Parish Treasurer.

Reports for the 2023 Annual Report were presented by title, by Spheres. Maurice Hill moved that the reports be accepted as presented. Deborah Brown seconded the motion, and it passed.

Gail Hill presented the 2024 Budget, pointing out the similarities and differences between this and the 2023 Budget. She noted that 2023 ended with a surplus of just over \$49,000, thanks in part to the fact that parishioners gave about \$27,000 more than they pledged. She also noted that pledges increased from \$192,103 in 2023 to \$208,224 in 2024. Major increases in this budget occur in salaries (having a full-time Rector), in insurance (having added cyber security insurance to our policy), and in the structure change in the Mission Share Fund calculations. With these increases, it was necessary to utilize \$58,224 of carryover (reserves) to balance the budget. There were two significant gifts to the Endowment Fund in 2023. Gail spoke about Designated Funds, specifically Food Ministries and Endowment Fund grants, and how the use of them does not impact the budget and everyday spending. Deborah Brown moved that the 2024 Budget be accepted as presented. Paul Amendt seconded the motion, and it passed.

Fr. Michael acknowledged those beloved parishioners who departed this life in 2023: Jennie Bemis, Sally Gillespie, and John Pearson.

The 2024 Vestry was inducted by Fr. Michael. They are Paul Amendt, Deborah Brown, Susan Doswell, Marjo Gardner, Teri Helton, Maurice Hill, Marianne Hyde, Tom Ledsam, and Lara Tyas.

After Fr. Michael expressed some of his own thoughts about coming among us at St. Columba's, he led us in The Lord's Prayer.

Having no further business, Teri Helton moved to adjourn the meeting at 12:11 p.m. Jarrel Fuller seconded the motion, and it passed.

#### **Rector's Report**

What a year! In the first book of *The Chronicles of Narnia*, by C. S. Lewis, *The Lion the Witch, and the Wardrobe*, you will recall that the Pevensie Children walked into a seemingly normal wardrobe, which was, in fact, a mysterious, magical gateway that took them to the magical land of Narnia, which was full of life that far exceeded the outer casing of the wardrobe.



This has been my experience coming to St Columba's. I started almost exactly a year ago and I have found so much life here, an abundance of grace and love. To mix my metaphors and quote from Dr. Who, it is so much bigger on the inside.

Like the Pevensie Children in the beginning of the story, this year has been a time of exploration and seeing how things work here and how things will work between us together. So, we have taken things very slowly.

Words seem inadequate to convey just how much I love this church. From the very beginning, you have opened your arms and have been so gracious to us. Thank you. Thank you for not being jaded but responding to us with love and openness. This has been such a special place for me to grow as a minister this year.

#### Adult Education

We have had various Adult Education opportunities. Our Junior Warden and one of our parish nurses, Teri Helton, led a wonderful series informing us of the things we need to know in order to have agency in our own health care, as well as mapped out the process of end-of-life care, to help prepare us. I can assure you that she continues to be available for any questions you might have regarding health care.

Her lovely husband, Dr. Tim Helton, presented his thought-out approach to what it means to be a Christian witness. He highlighted a relational approach that seeks to be present in the lives of others, and witnessing through friendship.

During Lent, we participated in the very fun and informative game (?) of *Lent Madness*, in which you place various Saints into Brackets to see who "wins" and makes it to the championship. Thank you to Susan Doswell for organizing that. We also partnered with Mount Cross for a Wednesday evening series discussing the Last Words of Christ on the cross.

During Eastertide, we offered a series on artistic representations of the Resurrection.

In the summer, we got to enjoy our labyrinth and fire pit, complete with s'mores, as we told Stories Around the Campfire. Specifically, we told the Gospel from that week's lectionary and discussed its significance. Thank you so much to Gail and Paul Amendt for all their hard work organizing.

As Autumn came around, we had our first Pub Theology night at Institution Ale Co. We drank and we discussed theology and spirituality with one another. Our plan is to have these Pub Theology nights every other month, starting on Tuesday, January 28. Finally, during Advent, Julie Russel led us in a *Lectio Divina* group, where we read the Gospel for that next week in a more spiritually mindful way, in order to allow the Holy Spirit to work through the passage and engage us on a more spiritual level.

We have added Morning Prayer into our spiritual offerings and will continue to explore new and traditional resources to help us as we continue to grow together into the life of Christ.

I am grateful for these opportunities for Adult Education and those who helped organize and teach. And I am also excited to offer even more opportunities for Adult Education this year.

#### Children's and Youth Ministry

This year, we said farewell to our Director of Family Ministries, Wendie Roberts. Wendie has put in many years of ministry, caring for our precious ones here at St Columba's. I am grateful for her faithfulness, even with that long drive. With more than a variety of health issues, Wendie's ability to participate in our ministry was somewhat sporadic this year, but we were grateful for the times she was able to be here. On a personal level, I am grateful for the ways she has loved my children during a time in which they were especially vulnerable with our big transition into the area.

Francina Anderson is taking over that ministry with Wendie's departure. She is also reestablishing our youth ministry and overseeing the installation of our children's area in the back of the church. Francina has a multi-subject elementary education teaching credential, with an emphasis in Mathematics in California. She has taught a variety of age groups in a classroom setting. She also has twelve-plus years of experience in youth ministry. She is excited to use her giftings and experiences to further our ability to minister to the children and youth who walk through our doors.

With our Children's, Youth, and re-established Acolyte Ministry, we are starting small, and trusting in the God who draws the precious ones to him, to bring them.

#### **Children's Learning Center**

Our Children's Learning Center is an extension of our ministry to the community. And they are doing a wonderful job. The program's reputation in the community is outstanding. We have full enrollment, with an immense waiting list. Our director Rebecca Mendoza-Martinez's enthusiasm is contagious. It has been a treat to watch students, parents, and teachers alike light up when they come into her vicinity. I am grateful for her partnership.

A significant goal this last year and this next year has been to further strengthen the bonds between the school community and the church. We have begun by being a presence at school activities and inviting school families to our activities. I have begun a bi-monthly letter that I send to school families. We have also re-established CLC Chapel, which we are moving to weekly chapels (alternating between Wednesdays and Thursdays). We are also seeking ways to be hospitable, inviting the school community into our spaces (church, parish hall, etc.) for their various activities, as well as fixing up those areas in and around the school to make it a more welcoming space for families.

In all of this, Rebecca has been immensely supportive and creative as we think of ways to further build inroads with school families.

#### Other Ministries of the Church

We have also continued to have excellent leadership over our feeding ministry by Maurice Hill and George Anderson. They have done a wonderful job of expanding that ministry. We are up to sixty-five families! Please continue to keep an eye out for the various needs of that ministry.


We have been also led well by our office staff members, Carol Browning and Sarah Monroe-Allen, our very talented Music Director, Brett Hanley and his team, our Vestry, and our various ministry leaders. Thank you all for your faithfulness and ownership of the ministry at St. Columba's.

I'm grateful also to Carol Rocco and her team for all their hard work with the Celtic Christmas Faire. It was very successful this year and is mutually beneficial for us and for the community and crafts people that attend. Thank you also to Paul & Gail Amendt who organized our new fundraiser, Oktoberfest, and Jenne Estes and her team who cooked all of that amazing German food.

This is a congregation that is deeply committed to growing into the grace of God, to leaning in to his Love and reflecting that love back to the community. Those commitments are clearly evident in the life of this parish.

This is God's church. As Saint Paul writes in his first letter to the Corinthians: "So neither the one who plants nor the one who waters is anything, but only God who gives the growth ... For we are God's coworkers, working together; you are God's field, God's building" (3:7, 9). The Eucharistic table is not mine, or Mark's, or Susan's, or Greg's. It is Jesus' table. I am grateful for the privilege of shepherding this wonderful community, in His Name.

# + Columbarium +



The Columbarium serves as a repository and testament for many of the lives that have blessed and enriched our parish life. The Columbarium has a total of 120 niches of which 86 have been contracted for. To date, sixty parishioners have been inured in the Columbarium.

There is a total of \$41,924 in the Columbarium accounts. There is \$6,924 in the Bank of America checking account and \$35,000 in the Treasury Direct account with the Federal government where we hold \$35,000 in T-bills. We earned \$1,750

in 2024 from the T-bills. We are working to ensure the financial solvency of the Columbarium. At this time, there are no large expenses associated with the upkeep of the Columbarium and no plans to expand it.

Historically, burial inside the church was once reserved to honor noteworthy clerics and nobles. Now it is possible to grant this blessing to all God's children to "dwell in the house of the Lord forever." Liturgically, it sets aside a place for remembrance and love for the departed. At \$900, the cost of the niche has been modest compared to a burial plot and is ecologically sound. Anyone interested in purchasing a niche in St Columba's Columbarium should contact Fr. # + Eucharistic Ministers and Lectors + + Storytellers +



A **Eucharistic Minister** is a lay person authorized to administer the Consecrated Elements at a Celebration of Holy Eucharist. A Eucharistic Minister should normally act under the direction of a Deacon, if any, or otherwise, the Member of the Clergy or other leader exercising oversight of the congregation or other community of faith. [*Canons of the General Convention*, Title III, Canon 4, Section 6]

Canon 4, Section 1 (a) specifies that this ministry is open to confirmed communicants in good standing and that they are licensed by the Bishop and under the direction of the Clergy in charge of the congregation.

The Eucharistic Ministers lead the Intercessions (Prayers of the People) and help with communion by administering the chalice for Communion.

Currently active and licensed Eucharistic Ministers are Paul Amendt, Mary Steppes-Cole, Maria Fernandez, Teri Helton, Marianne Hyde, Nancy Miller, Bob Waite, and Kevin O'Farrell.



**Lectors** are lay persons appointed by the Rector to assist in worship by reading the Old Testament Lesson and the Epistle, as well as by leading the recitation of the Psalm.

Currently, active Lectors are Paul Amendt, Mary Steppes-Cole, Marjo Gardner, Maurice Hill, Diane Off, Lara Tyas, Maria Fernandez, and Joel Doswell.

If you are interested in being involved in either of the above ministries, please talk with Fr. Michael.

Our **Biblical Storytellers** have been trained by the Rev. Dr. Dina Ferguson, past President of the Network of Biblical Storytellers, using a method known as



Scripture by Heart. The goal is to present the text of the appointed Lesson without referring to written text or notes—and to do it accurately as to both the text itself and the story being told. There is no requirement that the presentations be dramatic, although they can be; the primary difference between a Lector's and

a Storyteller's presentations is the immediacy of the words, without a lectern between the Storyteller and the congregation. Our current Storytellers are Paul Amendt and Nancy Miller. If you are interested in this ministry, please speak with Fr. Michael.

#### 💥 Children's Learning Center 💥



The staff, School Board, and our director have continued our mission to make St. Columba's Children's Learning Center Camarillo's premier Christian-based program. This year, we continued our mission to bridge the gap between a structure-based program and a play-based program, where all children can thrive and be better prepared emotionally and physically not just for kindergarten but for their whole life. Outdoor play continues to provide essential support for children's health and wellness, including brain development, social and emotional development, appropriate risk assessment, gross and fine motor development, coordination, and selfconfidence. This year we added a teacher who brought to life our outdoor space and we began introducing children as young as two years old to sports such as weight lifting, baseball/softball, basketball, golf and gymnastics. We added additional outdoor storage that a grant helped pay for on the big yard. Our major social events were well attended by church members, staff, parents, family and friends. Everyone enjoyed Back to School Night at the beginning of the year where the teachers introduced themselves and set goals with parents. Trunk-or-Treat was once again a huge success for all. This year we once again had our very own pumpkin patch and this year we introduced Spring Fest and it continues to be a huge success! The Christmas Program and Holiday Bundt Cake Sale were not only well received, but also the school's biggest fundraiser of the year. These events help give our school a sense of community and are also a lot of fun! We have continued to hold events where we participate in conjunction with the Church, in doing so we are working towards maintaining a strong partnership. Our summer program was once again a hit! Many families stayed throughout the summer and enjoyed the activities we provided. Over the summer each week the classes had different "camps." We offered Art Camp, Safari Camp, CLC National Park Camp, Olympic Camp, CLC Fairgrounds, and so many other camps. We transformed the outdoor spaces into a child's wonderland! CLC is in a good financial position, and has continued to have positive cash flow. Enrollment has continued to stay full for the 2023-2024 school year with a waiting list. Some of the major expenses we were able to accomplish this school year were the replacing the doors with a more durable and safer option. The school also provides a monthly pledge to the Church. The director has continued to attend meetings with local Preschool Directors Group allowing her to network, offer and receive support, information and maintain genuine friendship. Project Hope Pantry for Seniors and Families, St. Columba's Pantry, and Emergency Need Pantry, are all part of the food ministries at St Columba's. All food ministries at St. Columba's receive donations of funds and grocery items from our parish members, Food Share, neighboring churches, friends in the community, CROP Walk, as well as funds from the City of Camarillo through a HUD Federal Grant. We are a partner in the Food Share Network and Feeding America. We continue to be

ready to serve those who come to us in need of assistance. All people are welcome to receive food from any of our food ministries. We always accept grocery donations and cash or checks.

We provide food on the first, second, and fourth Thursday of each month. Project Hope provides food in the morning and afternoon on the 2nd and 4th Thursdays. St. Columba's Pantry provides food on the first Thursday afternoon. Food is also delivered to seniors who do not have transportation or are unable to pick up the food. Emergency Food is available when the church office is open. Carol Browning, our Office Manager, graciously meets clients in the office and provides them with needed grocery items.

The Food Ministries distributed staples, canned and dried food, bread, produce, and as available, fresh produce, and fresh and frozen protein items. Typically, we serve about 65 families on each distribution day. The number is rising: we have served over 70 families. Special thanks to those who work faithfully on our Food Ministries and have made sure that it supports the community. Food and supplies pickup at Food Share Warehouse on Tuesday mornings: George Anderson and Maurice Hill. Bag layout, food inventory set-up on Wednesdays: George Anderson, Doug Miller, and David Gardner. Thursday mornings for bag packing and parking lot distribution to client's cars: George Anderson, Doug Miller, Judith Laurentowski, Marjo Gardner, Michele Hauser, Richard Stone, and Fran Cogswell. The Thursday morning delivery crew for seniors without transportation: Judith Laurentowski, Frannie Cogswell, and Marjo Gardner. The Thursday afternoon/evening distributors: Doug Miller, Gene Doswell, Lyle & Marianne Hyde, Richard Stone, and Amanda & Hazel Meyer. Special thanks for their super support: The Boy Scouts of Troop 262 and Carlos Barraza for their annual food drive with the food being given to Food Share; the congregations of local churches for food and monetary donations: Trinity Presbyterian, Mount Cross Lutheran, Peace Lutheran, and Camarillo United Methodist; the CROP Walk and individual monetary donors; members of the community for their monetary donations; Food Share and HUD for most of the food that we distributed. Mount Cross held a food drive during their Vacation Bible School and donated the food to Project Hope-many thanks to the parishioners and especially Joe Zimmerly, Director of Children, Youth, and Family Ministries for orchestrating this event!

For Thanksgiving and Christmas, we gave gift cards to our seniors and younger families. The money for the gift cards was provided by St. Columba's Food Ministries funds. Our parishioners gave Christmas gifts to the children of our food ministries. Laura Jones knitted 50 watch caps for our food pantry families at Christmas—truly a work of love that was so well-received and appreciated! Many thanks, Laura!

Since August 18, 2006, the St. Columba's website has undergone many changes. On that date, *This Week at St. Columba's* began its life, with a weekly publication of events in the parish as well as from the wider church. The number of our email subscribers has increased considerably since our beginning.

In 2017, we rebuilt the entire website with a new hosting service. It is now more streamlined and much easier to edit and maintain. As a result, when new information is known, the website may be quickly revised. We can also add almost unlimited pages. Our website has continued to evolve to meet the changing needs of the community and the changing world with respect to the COVID pandemic. During the time we could not meet in-person, we opted for livestreamed services via Facebook and YouTube. As the pandemic threat lessened, St. Columba's returned to in-person worship services while keeping the format of livestreamed Spiritual Communion. That has given our website a new mission—namely, to livestream our services primarily for those with health issues that prevent them from attending in person, as well as those who may be scattered across the world. Because our services are recorded on Facebook and YouTube, they are available at any time for viewers to access. We will continue this hybrid format of worship as long as COVID remains a threat to the health and well-being of our members. We are also using a channel on YouTube for replaying services, sermons, or other recorded events. While this is an inconvenience for those who are not at ease with these platforms, it does have advantages. I have noticed that former members who moved away from us years ago have found us on Facebook, and left comments in which they have thanked us for our presence on the internet. We even have had "drop-in" viewers/worshipers from as far away as the United Kingdom and Africa. Through the magic of the internet, we can attend various services or events from the diocese or from the national church

I would like to thank those who have been the techno-wizards on the Stream Team that make the livestreamed and recorded services possible: Tim Helton, Nancy Miller, Richard Stone, Vinita Bhushan, Carlos Barraza, Bill Hillbrant, and Tim Brown. My job is to grab the links from their videos and post them on our webpage along with links to the service bulletins that Carol Browning so lovingly creates. We owe a tremendous debt of gratitude to the late Cliff Aggen for all the time and effort he put into making all our technology function seemingly effortlessly and mostly flawlessly. (There are always unforeseen "bugs" that arise in this process).

Thanks to Tim Helton and many others who helped to construct the roll-top desk for the computer equipment, cut a pew so it would fit into its location in the rear of the nave, and the job of making the hidden cable connections from the nave to the sound closet. Thanks also to those who donated funds and time and expertise to make this possible.

We also are using an online interactive calendar for publicizing Parish events. To access the calendar, simply click on "Monthly Calendar" under the tab "Upcoming Events" on our website. Users may download and print any part of the calendar, as well as send yourself email reminders of posted events. You may also send invitations to events to friends.

We are making every effort to make certain everyone is "in the know" by sending the weekly e-news *This Week at St. Columba's* and Constant Contact emails from our parish Office Manager, Carol Browning. If you are not receiving our emails, or if you know of anyone who would like to be included, please send an email with contact information to <u>office.manager@stcolumbaca.com</u>.

I invite each of you to take time and tour our website. Besides links to find our services, we have information posted about the church, the staff, parish calendar, recent sermons, parish history, our ministries, Vestry, how to donate, and much more. Some of the information I have posted needs to be revisited for revision, and I invite feedback so I can update what we have posted on our website. I welcome photos! If you have photos of events, email them to me and I will get them posted (within reason). In all matters, I try to keep our website up to date. Look for more changes to our website in the future.

#### **‡ Annual Pledge Campaign and Endowment Fund ‡**



The Stewardship Committee plans and carries out the stewardship program for time, talent, and treasure for St. Columba's. The committee graciously thanks all of you in the parish who contributed your time, talent, and treasure during 2024. The annual pledge campaign began November 3 this year. The theme of the pledge campaign was *Walk in Love*. This year, during Sunday services, Lyle

Hyde and Maria Fernandez graciously shared with the congregation their personal journey with Stewardship. Gail Hill presented the congregation with a Narrative Budget during a Sunday service. As of January 16, 2025, we received 51 pledges for 2025 for a total of \$233,315. The total represents an average of \$4,575 per pledge; the *total* amount is about \$25,070 higher as compared to what we received by this date in 2024. However, we are still receiving pledges from parishioners. The reported pledge numbers are current as of the date of submission of this report.

The 2024 Stewardship Committee members were Fr. Michael Anderson, Nancy Miller and Maurice Hill; Sarah Monroe-Allen is our Financial Secretary and Parish Pledge Secretary; and Gail Hill is Treasurer. Fr. Michael supported us through prayer, sermons, advice, and example. The Stewardship Committee always welcomes new members.

#### ‡ Endowment Fund ‡

*St. Columba's Endowment Fund Committee* was established by the Vestry in 2005. The purpose of the Committee is to implement a Planned Giving Program for St. Columba's. The 2024 committee members were Fr. Michael Anderson, Maria Fernandez, Gail Hill, Tim Helton, Nancy Miller, Doug Miller, Maurice Hill, and Tom Ledsam. Susan Doswell joined the committee as CEO once Fr. Greg retired in June 2022 and left the committee upon Fr. Michael's appointment. Many thanks go out to Susan for her service on the committee over the past few years. The Vestry approved our new member, Maria, who took Doug's position. Gail Hill is the current Treasurer and, as such, is an *ex officio* member of the Committee.

In 2024, the Endowment Fund Committee was notified that the Fund would receive a very generous donation from the estate of one of our parishioners. The donation will be invested upon receipt. These types of gifts will allow the committee to make larger annual grants to the Church in the future. As always, we gratefully accept donations to the Fund in any amount.

All funds in the Endowment Fund are tracked in St. Columba's monthly financial report and presented to the Vestry monthly. The monies in the Endowment Fund are held in an account through the Los Angeles Episcopal Diocese with the "Diocesan Investment Trust" (DIT), investments in a Vanguard exchange traded fund (ETF) and in a Vanguard Federal Money Market Fund at Vanguard Group (website: <u>https://www.vanguard.com/</u>). We also hold money in the church's Bank of America account as needed (as of 12/31/2024, there were no funds in this account).

The committee voted and the Vestry approved us to use Ridgeline Private Wealth Management to invest a portion of the fund (\$500,000) starting in December 2023. The committee oversees the account and makes decisions on the types and amounts of investments in accordance with our Plan of Operation. The firm manages and invests for us. We continued to hold funds in this account as of 12/31/2024.

The Endowment Fund has money invested in the Long-Term Diversified (LTD) Fund of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles Diocesan Investment Trust (DIT). The DIT continues to use Wilshire Associates, a Los Angeles firm, as its investment advisor. The balance for the LTD fund on 11/30/2024 was \$380,554.97. November is the most recent date we have DIT statements. Over the 12-month period from 11/30/2023-11/30/2024, we realized a 17 percent increase.

The Endowment Fund Committee also invests money in the Vanguard Total Stock Market Exchange Traded Fund (symbol VTI). This investment provides further diversification of a portion of our funds as we strive to achieve the long-term objectives of the Endowment Fund. Cash is held in a Vanguard Federal Money Market Fund (MM Fund) and Ridgeline. As of 12/31/2024, the Endowment Fund held a total of \$10,023.80 with Vanguard. This includes \$8,156.55 in VTI and \$2,075.44 in the MM Fund. On December 31, 2024, we held \$0 in the church's account at Bank of America, as all funds were transferred to Ridgeline for investment in 2023.

On December 31, 2024, we held \$628,966.40 with Ridgeline. For 2024, we realized a 24 percent increase.

In 2025, the Endowment Committee will recommend for Vestry approval a grant from the Endowment Fund to the church for 2025. The Committee will make the money available to the church upon request from the Vestry.

The grand total amount of the Endowment Fund as of December 31, 2024, was about \$1,020,000. This includes the Long-Term Diversified Diocesan Fund, the Vanguard investment, Vanguard money market funds, and Ridgeline investments. The total includes data from the DIT through November; we had not received the December DIT statement by the time of publication of this report.

The purpose of the Endowment Fund is to make funds available for ministries and other activities in the future, pursuant to the enabling resolution and Plan of Operation. In 2015, the Committee developed a policy to notify the Vestry every 4<sup>th</sup> quarter concerning funds available for expenditure for the upcoming year. Such grants are made from the Endowment Fund without invading the original principal—the total amount originally donated. The grant money comes from the money earned from our investments. The policy of the committee is to make available from 3-5 percent (of the average balance for the previous three years) or less each year.

The Endowment Committee hosted an Iona Society Celebration in August 2024. The event was graciously held at the Waite's home and 30 people attended. Many thanks to the Waites!

# **‡ Building & Grounds ‡**



Below, I am highlighting a bit of the work that we have been doing this year for our buildings and grounds:

#### Rectory Sceptic Tank

While there have been some longstanding concerns about the condition of our rectory sceptic tank, we received some unexpected, good news from a Sewer Specialist's inspection last February. The specialist suggested that we might have up to another ten years on the current system, with regular maintenance, including a visit in the next month or two. We are cautiously thankful that our sceptic system remains in much better shape than we should expect given its age. Moreover, in the event that the sceptic system fails, we have an easement which would allow us to install a hookup to the city and/or county sewage system.

#### Bee Removal and Roof Repair

In late March, we had five enormous beehives removed from our sanctuary attic. Our Bee Expert removed sixteen five-gallon buckets worth of bee colony pieces. This, naturally, required digging the hives out of the roof and walls. The necessary damage needed to be repaired as quickly as possible to prevent any more bees from entering into the attic and producing new hives. As we learned, the former presence of well-established hives makes the attic especially tempting to bees.

I am so grateful to Maurice Hill, who met with contractor after contractor to find someone willing and able to fix the damage. The contractor who ultimately rendered service came up with an alternative, less-expensive approach, which did not completely fix all the damage, but, nonetheless, it provided the needed coverage to keep out any new bees. The same contractor will begin phase II of the roof repair this year.

#### <u>Termites</u>

Another of our insect siblings has been enjoying the "benefits" of our church, Termites. We had scheduled to have the whole church and school tented in November. However, due to inclement weather (that seems like a theme this year!), we had to reschedule. Unfortunately, the next available date that works for both church and school is not until June. So, we have tentatively set a date for June 16. However, our specialist has assured us that there are no concerns for the integrity of the building, even with that delay. I am grateful to Susan Doswell who has been in regular contact with the various specialists.

#### <u>Future Plans</u>

We have a beautiful campus. God has truly blessed us with this place. Much of these last few years has been dedicated to learning more about the campus, after the unexpected death of Cliff Aggen, whose intimate knowledge of our buildings and grounds, unfortunately, remained in his own mind. Uncovering those mysteries continues.

We also have future plans to:

- Install a children's area in the church;
- Rethink the narthex to make it more hospitable;
- Fix up and paint our facia;
- Repair and pave the parking lot;
- Which will require a lot of work on our "root situation";
- Expanding the school playground to accommodate new programs;
- Cleaning and fixing up the pathway to the school;
- Building a new archway for the labyrinth;
- And smaller aesthetic fixes around the church campus.

I am thankful for those who guide us as we continue to be good stewards of this campus, including member of our Buildings & Grounds Committee, our Monday Morning Work Crew, Brett Hanley, and Gail Hill.

#### St. Columba's Treasurer's Report

In spite of our worries, 2024 ended up the year in the black! Our income was greater than our expenses by over \$18,000! Income was \$8,000 more than budgeted and expenses were about \$10,500 less than budgeted. Our parishioners were very generous, giving us \$52,000 more than they pledged!

We received dispensation from the Diocese to only pay them \$2,000 a month in 2024, about 9% of the operating income; 12% is expected. The primary reason expenses were low was because the cost of our property & casualty insurance actually went down. The National Church manages this cost and they do an excellent job.

Our 2024 budget projected a shortfall of \$58,000. Because of your generosity and pledges, we are only projecting a shortfall of about \$16,000 for 2025. We have sufficient funds in Reserve from past years when income exceeded expenses to cover this amount. There is over \$100,000 available.

The Vestry is stepping out in faith again this year: We are giving each of our employees a 3.22% raise. We are giving the Diocese the full 12% that we are obligated to pay. We are planning that we will work hard and receive more money from fundraising. And we are counting on plate offerings continuing to be generous as more new people join us at services. In late 2024, we hired a new janitorial service which is slightly more expensive but is doing excellent work.

Our Children's Education is going to be funded by an Endowment Grant this year. Wendie Roberts has retired and Francina Anderson, Fr. Michael's wife, an experienced and talented teacher, is joining us! We chose an Endowment Grant in order to give her more flexibility to make changes this first year.

2024 got us started but 2025 is an even more exciting time in the parish. Fr. Michael has joined us, brought out the best in us, and started growing our congregation again! We're solvent and gaining strength but continue to need support from each one of you. We believe that the Holy Spirit is with us!

As you'll read elsewhere in the reports, the Endowment Fund is doing very well! We have over \$1 million! That means that grants of 3-5% are forthcoming and can be spent on the maintenance and upgrade of our buildings and grounds—as well as Children's Education and any other program that Fr. Michael and the Vestry deem promising.

We audited the books for the parish and the Children's Learning Center. Anne Waite Thille and Amanda Meyer kindly did the work for free again. We did another more extensive audit, meeting the Diocesan requirements.

I wish to thank the Budget & Finance Committee for helping with the work: Beverly Pearson, Maria Fernandez, and our Financial Secretary, Sarah Monroe-Allen. If anyone would like to join us in this work or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. I thank each and every one of you for your generous donations to enable St. Columba's to continue its mission as an Episcopal parish and a member of the Camarillo community. Our intent is to keep the parish vital through careful management of our finances.
