### From the Rector

As a parent, one of the joys I look forward to most is introducing my children to the things I hold dear. Now that my two older kids are at an age where they can appreciate and engage with my favorites, I'm excited to share with them the British science fiction television series *Doctor Who*, Though *Doctor Who* first aired in 1963, my fandom began when it was relaunched in 2005.

At its heart, *Doctor Who* follows the adventures of the Doctor, a rogue Time Lord from the planet Gallifrey. The Doctor isn't just any time-traveler—he is a wanderer of the universe, righting wrongs and helping those in need, often accompanied by a human companion who can only be in awe of the Doctor's many feats. The Doctor travels in a ship called the TARDIS (Time and Relative Dimension in Space), a vessel that can traverse not only space but time itself, allowing the Doctor to step into any period of history, any point in the future, or even alternate realities.

What makes the show so engaging, aside from its imaginative adventures, is the mystery of the TARDIS itself. On the outside, it appears as an ordinary blue British police box, an artifact from 1960s Britain that has malfunctioned and remains stuck in that form. But when you step inside, you are met with the astonishing revelation: the TARDIS is "bigger on the inside." The inside is vast—an endless maze of rooms and corridors, far beyond what the small exterior suggests.

In one particularly striking episode, the soul of the TARDIS is transferred into a human form. This leads to a poignant exchange between the Doctor and this new incarnation, a woman named Idris. As awe-inspiring as the TARDIS is, Idris, possessed by the ship's soul marvels at the complexity and depth of human existence:

**IDRIS:** "Are all people like this?"

DOCTOR: "Like what?"

**IDRIS:** "So much bigger on the inside. I'm, oh, what is that word? It's so big, so complicated. It's so sad."

Idris' comment resonates deeply. It captures the paradox of the human condition—our hearts and minds are capable of vastness, complexity, and both joy and sorrow. The human experience, like the TARDIS, is not easily understood from the outside. We are so much more than we appear on the surface.

This idea also speaks to the mystery of God's presence within each of us. We so often look outward for answers or validation, but our true worth and depth are rooted in something far greater, if only we could sit still long enough to experience it. Much like the Doctor's own endless journey, we are invited to explore the dimensions of our own hearts, our relationships, and our connection to the divine. We are invited to delve deeper, to see beyond the surface and recognize the beautiful complexity within.

### From the Treasurer

We ended the year with excess funds!! Due to a couple of parishioners paying their entire pledge at the end of the year, the generous donation from one parishioner, and all the extra donations from many other regular pledgers, the income was much higher than we projected. Expenses ended up lower than budgeted so the combination gave us more income than expenses. Our 2024 budget deficit was projected to be \$58,000 so this was a huge hurdle to overcome. Due to everyone's generosity, we did it!

You'll hear about the Budget for 2025 at the Annual Meeting, but, bottom line, our projected deficit is much smaller and there is a good chance we will end up with enough income to cover that deficit in spite of increased costs. We're planning to give small raises to our employees. And we plan to pay the Diocese the entire 12% Mission Share Fund required. Any deficits that do occur will come from Reserves created by having excess funds at the end of the fiscal year. We currently have over \$100,000 to cover any issues.

The Buildings & Grounds Committee is still busy! The termite tenting was delayed due to the weather and the committee is looking for a time to do the work in the spring. Additional roof repairs will take place on the church building. The committee is working on other projects that need to be done. All the funds for these projects are coming from Designated Funds, not the budget that we use to pay salaries and normal operating expenses.

Part of these Designated Funds are grants from the Endowment Fund that can be spent on ministries or Buildings & Grounds projects. We still have about \$40,000 from the 2023/2024 grant of \$59,000 to spend on repairs and improvements! The 2 projects mentioned above will spend about \$32,000 of that grant. And the Endowment can provide another grant of 3-5% per year (equating to \$30,000-\$50,000) for further work. This is a good start to pay for what needs to be done. We are so blessed to have our Endowment Fund and give thanks for everyone who has donated to it.

We continue to bless each of you as we count your pledge on Sundays or receive it via PayPal. We're doing this together to maintain our church family, grow it to spread God's love, and continue the work that God intends for us to do. Fr. Michael has lots of wonderful ideas of how to do this and the Vestry is eagerly moving ahead with them.

If anyone would like to join us on the Budget & Finance Committee or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. We can truly use more help, thoughts, and ideas. We want to be transparent with expenses and income. If you would like to see the most recent Financial Report, please just ask. We don't take anyone and their contributions for granted. Thank you all!

### **Together**

In *Bread for the Journey*, theologian Henri J.M. Nouwen calls consolation—from "to be with" (con-) "the lonely one" (solus)—"one of the most important ways to care." He writes, "Life is so full of pain, sadness and loneliness that we often wonder what we can do to alleviate the immense suffering we see."

Although consoling doesn't necessarily remove someone's pain, Nouwen notes that it serves a deeper purpose: To console means "to be there and say, 'You are not alone, I am with you. Together we can carry the burden. Don't be afraid. I am here.' That is consolation. We all need to give it as well as to receive it."

### WHAT?

Last year, the flu led to 470,000 hospitalizations and 28,000 deaths. "It is clearly the season," according to Dr. Eduardo-Azziz-Baumgartner, a medical epidemiologist in the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's Influenza Division.

Young children, people who are pregnant, people with chronic health conditions, and older folks are more at risk for serious complications from the flu.

What to do. Read and learn for your information. Vaccines appear to be largely effective against currently circulating viruses, according to Richard Webby, a virologist at St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital in Memphis, Tennessee. The flu virus spreads mainly by droplets released when people cough, sneeze, or talk. A face mask may be in order. Wash your hands OFTEN. The hardest thing to do is: KEEP YOUR FINGERS OFF OF YOUR FACE.

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
