From the Rector

Last month, we looked at the first part of Dante's *Divine Comedy*, the *Inferno*. I suggested that Dante was concerned with the subject of sin, of what it is generally, and the fundamental nature of specific sins. One of the ways he accomplishes this is by offering concrete images of the distorting, malformational, self-sabotaging effects of sin on the body, the intellect, and the heart.

The imagery Dante uses is helpful for us during Lent as we look inward to see those unhealthy patterns of our lives that are still in need of redemption, which undermine our growth into the grace of God. The second part of Dante's poetic theology, the Purgatorio, likewise offers helpful insights, not just into the nature of sin, but also the nature of growth and redemption from sin. Like *The Inferno*, the characters who inhabit *Purgatorio* experience suffering. Unlike *The Inferno*, however, where the inhabitants are allowed to continue in their sin and vices as they sink deeper into the depths of their depravity, the suffering of the inhabitants of *Purgatorio* is redemptive.

Purgatorio is the image of the Christian journey of the soul to God. It is about the will, being drawn through the acknowledgement of sin, to slowly reflect God's will for us. The Purgatorio explores the process of our being made blessed, something which is the work of God, a work that does not crush our humanity but perfects it. It is the transforming and renewing grace of God that perfects and restores our wounded and fallen nature.

Take, for instance, the inhabitants who are being redeemed from the sin of pride. Dante pictures them as bent double, bowed low with heavy stones. Pride is about being puffed up and so full of ourselves that we deny the reality and needs of others.

In contrast, Dante describes engravings which depict three examples of humility. The first is from the life of the Holy Mother, Mary, and recounts the Annunciation. The second is the story of King David who dances before the Ark of the Covenant, which scandalizes his proud wife. The third is the Emperor Trajan, who is moved by the needs of the poor widow to interrupt his campaign. Contemplating the virtue of humility displayed in these engravings spurs the devotion of those being redeemed.

They then put their growing virtue of humility into practice by praying the Lord's Prayer, not for themselves, because—as those who have died—they do not need to pray it for themselves, but instead they pray for others who remain alive. Built into the structure of the *Purgatorio*, is the principle that, in the patterns of holy life, prayer, liturgy, and service, we encounter the presence of the grace of God, through which the disordered parts of our souls are set right, and our vices are transformed into virtues.

From the Treasurer

February, year-to-date, looks fine. We're ahead by about \$5,400, which is not unusual for this early in the year. We'll need to do fundraising to meet our budget projections but there are no concerns right now. We're projected to need to use about \$19,000 of the \$100,000 we have in Reserves this year.

You are all amazingly generous. The amount pledged for 2025 is \$243,000, and people are paying their pledges. That is an increase of over \$30,000 from 2024's pledged amount! So many people increased their pledges and many of our new parishioners began pledging for the first time. We are truly blessed!

The Buildings & Grounds Committee is still busy. The roofing repair that was supposed to take place after the tenting got moved up due to a leak during the last storms. It has been completed. The termite tenting was delayed due to the weather, and it has been scheduled for June to meet the Children's Learning Center's needs. The Committee is working on other projects that need to be done. Thus far, all the funds for these projects are coming from Designated Funds, not the budget that we use to pay salaries and normal operating expenses.

Part of these Designated Funds are grants from the Endowment Fund that can be spent on ministries or Buildings & Grounds projects. We still have about \$30,000 from the 2023/2024 grant of \$59,000 to spend on repairs and improvements. The tenting should cost about \$20,000. And the Endowment can provide another grant of 3-5% per year (equating to \$30,000 - \$50,000) for further work. This is a good start to pay for what needs to be done. We recently received a donation from the trust of Lois Barcroft for \$30,000, which will be put to good use. We are so blessed to have our Endowment Fund and give thanks for everyone who has donated to it!

We do have some more expensive repairs coming up though, so we may be asking for extra funds for those specific projects, like the parking lot repaying.

We continue to bless each of you as we count your pledge on Sundays or receive it via PayPal. We're doing this together to maintain our church family, grow it to spread God's love, and continue the work that God intends for us to do.

If anyone would like to join us on the Budget & Finance Committee or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. We can truly use more help, thoughts, and ideas. We want to be transparent with expenses and income. If you would like to see the most recent Financial Report, please just ask. We don't take anyone and their contributions for granted. Thank you all!

The ear, it strikes like lightnings to hear him sing; The glassy peartree leaves and blooms, they brush


The descending blue; that blue is all in a rush With richness; the racing lambs too have fair their fling.

STRETCH and REACH

Need to stretch and reach to find something in the closet? Might have to stand on my tiptoes. Please, DON'T. You need to know our bodies change as the years go by. Our range of motion is not as wide, muscles are not as strong as "used to be," and balance is a bit wobbly at times. All of this means "you have to reach farther to get something," says Jim Zachazewsky, a physical therapist with Mass General Brigham Sports Medicine.

Reaching up doesn't seem troublesome until you suffer an unintended consequence. Possible injuries could be shoulder strain or tearing a shoulder muscle, reaching up too far and arching your back could strain a neck muscle, or you could lose your balance in mid-grab and fall. Your object may be heavier than you remembered; just decide that help is a better idea. Determine in advance where you'll set down the object. It needs to be an uncluttered spot and as close to you as possible.

Also identify something to hold on to, like a counter, cabinet, doorframe, closet bar, or the handhold of a ladder. Be mindful, if you should fall, that nothing is at your back that would hurt if you fell on it. Keep your free hand ready to reach as you stabilize yourself with the other hand.

The risk of incomplete planning outweighs the benefit of trying to get it on your own. You are more important than your project. Safety is a great benefit.
