From the Rector

I've always wanted to make art. But for most of my life, I assumed I wasn't any good at it—and I was too intimidated to try, afraid I'd only confirm the suspicion. Lately, though, I've decided that whether or not I have any talent, I want to learn. So I've started attending some workshops at the Channel Islands Art Studio.

In one of my regular classes, the teacher has been encouraging me to draw with what she calls a "searching line." She means the kind of line that doesn't aim for precision right away, but instead feels its way across the page—exploring the shape of a thing rather than declaring it outright. It's not about getting it right on the first try. It's about discovering the form as you go.

I find this surprisingly difficult. The inner critic pipes up quickly, and more often than not, the drawing gets stalled before it really begins. But as I've spent time with this idea of the searching line, I've come to see that it has something to teach us about the spiritual life—about how we seek, and fumble, and slowly find our way.

We draw not because we already know, but because we're trying to see. The searching line isn't bold or certain. It wavers, doubles back, tries again. It's not the line of mastery, but of discovery. That's how most of our lives with God feel, if we're honest. Not straight and clean, but uncertain. Not a finished picture, but a sketch in progress.

We're not God. We don't speak and light appears. We fumble our way forward—trusting that something true is there, even if we can't quite name it yet. The searching line is an act of faith. It's humble. It listens. It doesn't demand the answer right away, but keeps moving, keeps asking. That's what prayer can be like. That's what following Jesus can be like. Trying. Failing. Returning. Not because we're lost, but because we're still learning to see. The searching line reminds us: It's okay not to have everything figured out. What matters is the attention, the willingness to look again, to reach out again, to believe that something beautiful might emerge.

In the Gospels, even the disciples didn't see clearly at first. They stumbled. They misunderstood. They drew their lines and redrew them. But Jesus stayed with them. He stays with us, too. In the trying. In the tracing. In every shaky line that says, "I don't know for sure, but I think it might be this way." And maybe that's the holiest thing of all: Not the perfect picture, but the honest attempt to draw near.

From the Treasurer

May, for the month and year-to-date, we have more expenses than income. Our expenses are where we budgeted them to be; our income is a little low because we haven't created any income from fundraisers and we're a little behind on pledges. We're still not concerned. We're projected to need to use about \$19,000 of the \$100,000 we have in Reserves this year. We have plenty of funds in the bank so things are not urgent.

You are all amazingly generous. Please continue to give what you can and what you pledged. We are truly blessed!

The Buildings & Grounds Committee is still busy. The termite tenting was completed! The \$16,000 expense came out of the 2024 Endowment Grant so there was no problem paying for the work.

The parking lot repaying seems to be the next large project planned. We will be asking for extra funds for this specific project. The Committee, led by Fr. Michael, is hard at work planning and getting bids for the parking lot and some of the other work needed on our campus.

The septic tank at the rectory was pumped out again and inspected; further work will be required on it. The Committee is working on other projects that need to be done. Thus far, all the funds for these projects are coming from Designated Funds, not the budget that we use to pay salaries and normal operating expenses.

I'm repeating this because it's still true: Part of these Designated Funds are grants from the Endowment Fund that can be spent on ministries or Buildings & Grounds projects. We still have about \$8,000 from the 2023/2024 grant of \$59,000 to spend on repairs and improvements. And the Endowment can provide another grant of 3-5% per year (equating to \$30,000 - \$50,000) for further work. This is a good start to pay for what needs to be done. We are so blessed to have our Endowment Fund and give thanks for everyone who has donated to it!

We continue to bless each of you as we count your pledge on Sundays or receive it via PayPal. We're doing this together to maintain our church family, grow it to spread God's love, and continue the work that God intends for us to do.

If anyone would like to join us on the Budget & Finance Committee or see what we're doing in more detail, you are more than welcome. We can truly use more help, thoughts, and ideas. We want to be transparent with expenses and income. If you would like to see the most recent Financial Report, please just ask. We don't take anyone and their contributions for granted. Thank you all!

Forum on Black Christianity

At 7:00 p.m. on July 15, the Ventura County Interfaith Community will gather at Bethel African American Episcopal Church (855 S. F St, Oxnard, CA 93030). There, Bethel's pastor, Rev. Benjamin Thomas will discuss the ways that the African American experience has differentiated Black Christianity from other branches of Christianity.



I think I'm a healthy person. I take two or three hour-long brisk walks a week. However, I spend a lot of time on the computer and a lot of time watching TV.

A brisk walk (about 3mph) for at least 150 minutes per week improves your health. Do you know that 150 minutes per week is just 2% to 3% of your waking hours?

The Journal of the American College of Cardiology followed 90,000 people, average age of 62, for a year. The study kept detailed records of everyone's health history. The published results confirmed that moderate to vigorous physical activity for at least 150 minutes per week does improve your health, particularly your heart health. Those folks who were the most sedentary the rest of the time had a greater risk of developing heart failure when compared to those who were less sedentary.

We have changed our lives. Farmers and people doing manual labor until about 1700 made up 80% of the population. That changed to 40% by 1900. Today, it's less than 2%.

Scientists at Harvard have been discovering health-promoting molecules that are produced by our bodies when we exercise. Dr. Komaroff says, "After reading this study, I've decided to get up every hour and climb the stairs. I think being active through the day will improve my health."

Holy Ground

For me, there's nothing quite like taking off my sandals in the summer and walking through the grass. But when our sons were infants, neither shared that love of going barefoot. When we'd attempt to lower them to play outside, they'd raise their legs, trying not to touch the tickly, prickly, green ground.

"Do not come any closer," the Lord warned Moses through the burning bush. "Take off your sandals, for the place where you are standing is holy ground" (Exodus 3:5, NIV). In God's presence, Moses faced a turning point: either resist God's instructions or obey, leading the Israelites out of Egypt.

Maybe taking off my sandals this summer can remind me that I'm standing in God's presence. I may not hear a booming voice, and I might just be standing at the kitchen sink doing chores.
